
Aphasia

can recognize people, images, icons can understand numbers, money, and time



Lingraphica

Lingraphica is an important device because it allows people with aphasia to:

find words (verbs are animated) construct sentences see lips mouthing words

regain power of speech (in some cases)
track use
carry their communication with them (Smalltalk)
