### Course Description

ENG 424/824 is an introductory course in *phonology*—the study of the sound systems of particular languages, and *morphology*—the study of word structure and word formation. Together we will (i) learn the fundamentals of phonetic transcription, which will enable us to analyze phonological systems of languages and gain insight into how sounds are represented in the minds of speakers; (ii) study phonological rules and processes and how sound systems of languages are organized; (iii) study rules by which morphemes combine to form words and how the word formation system interacts with phonology. The work in this course should sharpen your skills of analysis, show you new ways of thinking, and open new perspectives on your own language(s).

### Course Goals

In this course, you will:

- Observe, describe, and explain sound patterns using the tools of phonemic analysis
- Perform morphological analysis: identify morphemes in a given data set and explain how they are combined to form words
- Gain an appreciation of the morphological and phonological diversity and systematicity found in languages of the world
- Research and effectively present an original project applying phonological and morphological analysis to a topic of real-world relevance

## Assessment

- **Homework assignments** (60% total)

There will be 8-9 homework assignments to be submitted through iLearn. They are due before class begins on the day that they are due. In the assignments, you are asked to provide an accurate, concise description of the linguistic data and a clear argument for a specific proposal that accounts for the data.

Homework assignments are open note and open book. Working together on homework assignments is both allowed and encouraged—but, while you may discuss your answers and your reasoning with each other, each student's assignment must be written up entirely independently, without help. If you discuss your work with others, note their names at the top on your assignment to give them credit.

- **Midterm** (20%)

The midterm exam will be a short, open book, open note exam, to be submitted through iLearn. This exam is scheduled for Week 5 (early!) and it will test your understanding of topics in phonology. The midterm is to be completed individually.

There is no final exam for undergraduate students.

- **Research project** (20% total)

Together with another student, you will research a topic of your choosing concerning the phonology and/or morphology of a particular language and present your results to the class at the end of the semester. The research project has a few milestones; see the course schedule. Graduate students will write up their research findings as a paper, submitted in lieu of the final exam.

Attendance at class meetings and active participation are critical components of this class; attendance is taken at each class session. This class involves extensive in-class analysis and discussion of language data and theoretical concepts; students will frequently work together in small groups and pairs. Please come to class prepared to participate with questions and insights about assigned readings and ready to collaborate with your peers.
