Summary: To examine the causes of marital instability throughout the life course, six waves of data were collected between 1980 and 2000 from married individuals who were between the ages of 18 and 55 in 1980. Information collected in 1980 (Wave I) focused on the effects of wives' participation in the labor force on marriage and marital instability. Measures predicting marital instability and divorce and assessing marital quality were developed. Variables include information on earnings, commitment to work, hours worked, and occupational status. The focus of Wave II, conducted in 1983, was to link changes in factors such as economic resources, wife's employment, presence of children, marital satisfaction, life goals, and health to actions intended to dissolve a marriage, such as divorce and permanent separation. Information on adjustment to marital dissolution, relationship with in-laws, size of home, parents' employment, use of free time, club membership, child-care arrangements, and responsibility for chores was gathered. Wave III, collected in 1988, further examined the impact of changes in employment, economics, and health on marital relationships. Questions were asked about divorce and remarriage, investment of energy and resource use in the care of aging parents and dependent offspring, asset value, awareness of aging, mental health issues, and history of disease. In 1992, Wave IV data were collected to look at changes in employment, economics, and health. Questions were asked about retirement issues, family structure, and the impact of caring for aging parents while at the same time caring for dependent offspring. Data were also collected in 1992 and 1994 from adult offspring who were living in the household in 1980 and had reached age 19 by 1992, thus providing parallel measures with their parents regarding the quality of parent-child relationships, attitudes, and support along with exploring the impact of childhood experiences on the transition to adult life. In 1997, the fifth wave was collected and interviews were conducted with a second sample of adult offspring ( $\mathrm{N}=202$ ) along with second interviews of offspring selected in 1992 ( $\mathrm{N}=606$ ). Wave V also examined the relationship between marital quality and stability and how it relates to changes in marital quality later in life. In 2000, Wave VI data were collected. Included with the adult panel was a panel obtained from the offspring who participated in 1992 or 1997, a replicate of the original cross-section study completed in 1980 (comprised of currently married persons between the ages of 19
and 55), along with a comparison sample made up of persons who were married in 1980 and were between 39 and 75 years old. The investigators examined whether there were changes in marital quality between 1980 and 2000, identified factors that might have accounted for these changes, and sought to determine their impact on the health and longevity of older persons. New questions included in Wave VI covered whether the respondent thought he/she had an organized lifestyle, alcohol and tobacco use, health problems, physical limitations, and mattering (the level of concern expressed for and received from spouse). Among the variables included in all six waves are age, sex, educational attainment, marital status and history, attitude toward divorce, number of children, religious affiliation, and income level.

Universe: All intact marriages in the continental United States with partners between the ages of 18 and 55 in 1980 and living in households with telephones.

Sample: National probability sample. The sample was selected using a random-digit dialing cluster technique. Data were weighted to adjust for underrepresentation in metropolitan areas.

Date of Collection: fall 1980, fall 1983, spring 1988, 1992, 1994, 1997, 2000
Data Collection Notes: (1) Because of additional cleaning of the data performed by the principal investigator, this data collection supersedes earlier versions (ICPSR 9199, ICPSR 9200, ICPSR 9747, and ICPSR 2163). (2) In processing this collection, ICPSR did not change missing data codes defined by the principal investigators, at their request, and SAS and SPSS system missing data values were assigned numeric codes for each variable. Also, an unmarried case in Wave I was deleted at the principal investigators' request. (3) The codebooks are provided by the principal investigator as Portable Document Format (PDF) files. The PDF file format was developed by Adobe Systems Incorporated and can be accessed using PDF under software, such as the Adobe Acrobat Reader. Information on how to obtain a copy of the Acrobat Reader is provided on the ICPSR Web site.

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## PREFACE

The purpose of this report is to provide information on the technical aspects of the data collected in 2000. Four data sets were collected in 2000: (1) sixth wave of interviews (referred to as the adult panel) with a national sample of persons who were married in 1980 and interviewed in 1980, 1983, 1988, 1992, and 1997, (2) a short mail survey (referred to as the offspring panel) administered to the offspring panel respondents who participated either in 1992 or 1997, (3) a nationwide random digit dialing (RDD) cross-section of currently married persons between the ages of 19 and 55, (referred to as the cross-section) designed as a replicate of the original cross-section study completed in 1980, and (4) a comparison sample of persons who would have been eligible for the original panel study conducted in 1980, (referred to as the comparison sample) eligible respondents for this group had to be persons married in 1980 and between the ages of 39 and 75 .

Entitled "Marital Instability Over the Life Course 1980-1998," data and methodology reports on the first five waves are available from Data Archivist, Population Research Institute, Pennsylvania State University, University Park, PA 16802 (darragh@pop.psu.edu) and InterUniversity Consortium for Political and Social Research, P.O. Box 1248, Ann Arbor, MI 48106. The sixth wave was funded, in part, by grant number 1 R01 AG16346-02 from the National Institute on Aging.

The theoretical framework guiding the sixth wave of investigation may be found in the proposal in Appendix A. The purpose of the sixth wave was to continue examining the relationship between life course and marital instability. The study focuses on three issues. First, considerable debate centers on the question of whether marital quality has changed in recent decades. The present study informs this debate by examining changes in marital quality between 1980 and 2000 and identifying factors accounting for these changes. Second, changes in marriage and family life
have consequences for the health and longevity of the middle-aged and elderly; however, only a few aspects of marriage and family life have been studied in this context, and the mechanisms are not well understood. The results of this study will provide a comprehensive picture of the impact of family and marital history on health. Third, the number of family and life course scholars employing longitudinal designs has increased in recent years, yet we know little about the ways in which panel attrition affects the accuracy of findings. The present study will compare crosssectional and longitudinal data to gain a better understanding of panel attrition, as well as how biases resulting from attrition might be corrected. The remainder of the report describes the following activities in detail: tracking procedures, selecting the cross-section sample, interview schedule construction and pretest, obtaining the interviews, response rates, representativeness of the 2000 interview, and management of the study.

## RESEARCH PROCEDURES

Tracking Members of the Panel. To maintain the integrity of the panel, respondents were tracked in the fall of 1999. Letters were sent to all respondents giving them a progress report on the study (Appendix C). The letters were sent with "Address Correction Requested" so that study staff were informed of address changes and bad addresses where the letter could not be delivered. Those individuals were tracked and lists of addresses and telephone numbers updated.

All offspring respondents that participated in either 1992 or 1997 were sent a letter in the spring of 2000 updating them on the study. Also included was a short survey asking about changes in their work/family life since 1997. A postcard reminder followed by an identical survey were sent to those respondents who had not yet returned the short survey (Appendix C). Several surveys came back unopened due to incorrect addresses; therefore, a substantial amount of tracking was conducted. Tracking consisted of searching the internet for updated addresses and telephone numbers, contacting references offered by the respondent in the last wave of data collection, and contacting the offspring respondent's parent who participated in the adult panel survey.

Selecting respondents for the cross-section sample. A random digit dialing (RDD)
procedure was utilized to select the 2000 cross-section and comparison samples. The sampling frame for the cross-section was designed to replicate the selection of respondents used in 1980. To be eligible for the cross-section, respondents had to be 19-55 years old, currently married and living with their spouse. The comparison sample was designed to select respondents who would have been eligible for the original 1980 study. To be eligible for the comparison sample, respondents had to be 39-75 years old, married and living with their spouse in 1980. The comparison sample screening was omitted from waves 8 and 9 because a large enough sample of people married in 1980 was already obtained from waves 1-7.

When a household was contacted, the interviewer asked how many adults between 19 and

75 years of age permanently resided in that household. (This screening process was changed for waves 8 and 9, where households were asked how many residents were between 19 and 55.) Once the interviewer entered the number of adults, the computer randomly selected the designated respondent. This person was then designated as the only person in that household to be interviewed. Once the designated respondent was on the telephone, a few screening questions were asked. Respondents were asked which age category they belonged, then based on that answer they were asked if they were currently married and living with their spouse (asked if between 19-55) and/or if they were married and living with their spouse in 1980 (asked if between 39-75). If the respondent fit into either category, they were administered the survey (the cross-section and comparison sample were administered the same survey). If they did not fit into either category, they were screened out of the study and that household was considered ineligible.

Interview Construction and Pre-test. Three surveys were created for 2000 data collection. Using most of the scaled individual items from 1997, the 2000 adult panel survey was similar to the 1997 one. Another survey was created for the 2000 RDD cross-section and the comparison sample, a close replicate of the original 1980 survey with some additional items that appeared in subsequent waves. Items included in both surveys are marital quality measures, household division of labor, employment experience, residential mobility, attitudes towards divorce, factors judged to keep the marriage together, extent to which the individual's spouse met his/her expectations, mental/physical health, adjustment among the divorced and permanently separated, locus of control, and items assessing people's evaluation of the timing of their retirement (Appendices F, H, and I). The adult panel survey also includes changes in household composition and fertility, and changes in marital situation. A few new sets of questions were added to the questionnaire in the sixth wave after being pre-tested: organized lifestyle, alcohol and tobacco use, health problems, physical limitations, and mattering (concern for and from spouse). Appendix D lists the questions that were pre-tested. Skip
patterns were created and a few items were dropped after analyzing the pre-test data.
A third survey was created for the offspring panel. This survey included a short report of changes that occurred since 1997, demographic questions such as age, income, education, employment, and a few additional attitudinal questions. See Appendix C for the mail survey format and Appendix G for the frequencies.

Computer aided telephone interviewing was used for the adult panel and the new crosssection and comparison sample surveys. Interviewing manuals are found in Appendix J. The offspring survey was created as a mail survey; however, in an effort to increase the response rate, some interviews were collected through telephone calls.

Obtaining the Interview. Every effort was made to re-interview the adult panel respondents. Respondents who had relocated outside the United States were called or sent the interview schedule by mail. Respondents who could not be reached because the telephone was no longer in service or because someone else had been assigned the number were turned over to trackers. We contacted the personal references of respondents who we were unable to track by internet, mail or telephone for forwarding addresses or new telephone numbers. People who initially refused to be re-interviewed were called back by another interviewer. Due to the resistance we found with doing the long interview over the telephone, a mail survey was offered as an option for reluctant respondents. As a result, 105 respondents completed the entire survey via mail. There were still a substantial number of panel respondents who did not return the original mail survey; therefore, a new shorter version of the survey was created. This survey was sent through the mail to all non-respondents (Appendix C). The response to this short mail survey was poor, so additional efforts were made to obtain these interviews. All non-respondents were called and asked to do the short survey over the telephone. If they did not want to complete the survey over the telephone, they were asked to return the mail survey that they had already been sent. The short survey produced an additional 47 interviews (25
by telephone and 22 by mail).
The offspring panel was sent a short survey through the mail (Appendix C). All bad addresses were tracked using the internet, contacting their parents, or personal references provided by the respondent during the last wave. Respondents were offered the option of completing the survey over the internet; however, only one respondent did so. After trying to conduct the mail survey by sending the survey, a postcard reminder, and a follow-up survey, the response rate was less than $60 \%$. In order to improve the response rate, all non-respondents were called and asked to do the survey over the telephone. Collecting additional data over the telephone increased the response rate to $86 \%$. Because the offspring panel is made up of young adults who relocate often, it is likely that the remaining non-respondents are offspring who never received the survey because we could not locate them.

To address the challenges associated with obtaining data from a new cross-section of married persons nationwide, pre-notification incentives were implemented for the cross-section and comparison samples. Pre-notification incentives were not part of the original study design; however, we found that our response rate was low for the first three waves of sample, so we added pre-notification letters to the design in an effort to increase the response rate. Starting with the fourth wave, the sample telephone numbers were reverse matched with the name and address of the person assigned to that telephone number. Pre-notification letters were sent to all names and addresses that matched our sample telephone numbers (Appendix C). Part of the wave four matches were also sent a $\$ 2$ bill along with their letter as an added incentive (Appendix C). We found that sending the pre-notification letter along with the $\$ 2$ bill was the most successful at increasing the response rate; therefore, sample waves five through nine were all reverse matched, and all matches were sent a pre-notification letter with a $\$ 2$ bill incentive. In addition, refusals from the first three waves were also reverse matched. The first set of refusals, which included refusals
that occurred during the first month of data collection were reverse matched and then mailed a prenotification letter. Another batch of refusals that occurred after the first month were also reverse matched, and then they were mailed a pre-notification letter along with a $\$ 2$ bill incentive. As another incentive, while trying to convert refusals, some were offered $\$ 10$ upon completion of the interview, but this option was only accepted by 44 respondents.

In addition to offering incentives to respondents, an alternative data collection method was offered. Some respondents were unwilling to do the survey over the phone, but were receptive to the idea of completing the survey on their own time using a computer. The survey was too long and complicated to put on the internet or to make a paper copy, so the survey was put onto a disk and then mailed to the respondents. The respondent was then able to insert the disk into their home computer and complete the survey on the disk and then mail it back to us (Appendix C). Of the 102 disk surveys mailed out, 36 (35.3\%) were returned as completed interviews.

Response Rate Estimates. Of the 1,066 people who were interviewed in 1997,* we succeeded in re-interviewing 962 (90.2\%) of the adults (Table 1).

[^0]All offspring who were interviewed either in 1992 or 1997 were sent a short survey through the mail. Offspring were eligible in 1992 if they lived with their interviewed parent in 1980 and were 7 years of age or older in that year. Offspring were eligible in 1997 if they lived with their interviewed parent in 1980 and were between the ages of 2 and 6 in that year. Table 2 shows the estimated response rates of offspring panel respondents. We succeeded in re-interviewing 595 (86.1\%) of the offspring panel. This survey was designed as a mail survey, but calling the respondents and having them do the survey over the phone increased the response rate by $27.9 \%$. Most of the remaining respondents were cases that never returned their survey, which included several respondents that we were unable to track, so several did not receive the survey at all.

Before analyzing the response rates for the cross-section RDD sample, a couple of unique problems associated with the RDD sample used in this study will be briefly discussed. Determining an exact response rate is difficult to produce using an RDD sample because it is sometimes impossible to determine a final outcome for each telephone number included in the sample. Due to the RDD sample design, several numbers in the sample are not working numbers. While many nonworking numbers reach a message that explains the status of that telephone number, such as being disconnected or unassigned, a substantial number of non-working numbers remain without a final
outcome because they never reach a message recording. The telephone numbers that are not assigned a final outcome typically are numbers that produce a ring with no answer or a fast busy signal. These numbers are called several times, but often remain without a final outcome.

Groves and Kahn (1979) examined these types of telephone numbers and found that a large proportion of the numbers were unassigned. Through researching efforts to determine why these numbers ring, they discovered that many of these numbers were switched to ringing machines rather than voice recording machines (that explain the status of that number), due largely to central offices not being able to afford enough voice recordings to handle all of the unassigned telephone numbers.

In addition to non-working telephone numbers, another problem encountered when determining response rates for this sample is the screening process used to select eligible respondents. Not all working household numbers were eligible to participate in this study. The household member randomly selected had to be either currently married and between that ages of 19 and 55 or married in 1980 and between the ages of 39 and 75 . (For waves 8 and 9, the respondent had to fit into the 19 to 55 currently married category.) The cross-section and comparison sample shared the same sample database. Since we do not know which telephone numbers have eligible respondents in which eligibility group, it is impossible to calculate individual response rates, so the cross-section and comparison sample response rates are calculated together.

Table 3 presents the outcome of all the calls included in the RDD sample. Out of all the telephone numbers included in the sample, 3428 (11.9\%) were known eligible households where the randomly selected respondent was eligible for the study. This number only includes those cases that eligibility was determined, which means the respondent answered a few questions to determine eligibility. A few of the other categories (refusals, non-response, and no resolution) also probably
include some eligible telephone numbers; however, these households were never asked the screening questions to determine eligibility. Of the cases that were asked the screening questions, $44.7 \%$ were found to be eligible for the study. A similar proportion of eligible respondents is expected to be found among the "refusal," "non-response," and the "no resolution, working number" categories where eligibility was not determined. The remaining category that may contain some eligible cases, "no resolution, unknown if working number," falls into the type of telephone numbers investigated by Groves and Kahn (1979). Based on their analysis, our estimate of working numbers in that category is $10 \%$. Of that $10 \%$ working numbers, the same proportion of eligible respondents (44.7\%) used for the other categories previously mentioned would be applied.

Table 4 presents the dispositions of all households that were determined to be eligible for the study. Of the 3428 known eligible households, 3092 (90.2\%) resulted in a completed interview, with an additional 136 (4.0\%) resulting in a partially completed interview. Refusals make up most
of the remaining eligible households with 153 (4.5\%). Most of the initial refusals were called back by another interviewer in an attempt to convert, of which 483 were converted into a completed interview. The 35 "no resolution" cases include eligible respondents who we were still trying to complete the interview with; we had already determined their eligibility, but the data collection period ended before we could conduct the survey with them. Finally, the "non-interview" cases are those in which eligibility was determined, but the respondent was found to be unable to complete the interview because of language difficulties or health problems.

A few different response rates were calculated for the 2000 cross-section/comparison survey. Unfortunately, the sample consists of telephone numbers rather than specific persons; therefore, the response rate can be interpreted in two ways. Table 5 shows the various formulas used to calculate the response, cooperation, and refusal rates; and Table 6 shows the calculated rates.

The first interpretation is considering the response rate of cooperation among all possible working household telephone numbers regardless of eligibility for the study. To calculate this, the total number of interviews (completed, partially completed, and screen-out interviews) is divided by the sum of the number of interviews, the number of non-interviews (refusals, non-response, and no
resolution working telephone numbers), and the number of all telephone numbers where working status is unknown. Response rate 1A (51.1\%) calculates this rate by estimating that all of the no resolution telephone numbers are possible working household numbers. Response rate 1B (60.9\%) is different by assuming that only $10 \%$ of the no resolution telephone numbers whose working status is unknown are actually working household numbers. Grove and Kahn (1979) found a large proportion of those type of telephone numbers to be non-working; however an exact proportion was not provided. We believe an estimate of $10 \%$ is a relatively conservative estimate of working numbers in this category.

The other interpretation is calculating the response rate only for eligible numbers, that is, working household numbers with an eligible designated respondent. All working household telephone numbers where the designated respondent does not qualify for the study would be considered ineligible. Response rate 2 (58.9\%) is calculated by dividing the number of eligible interviews (completed and partially completed) by the sum of the number of eligible interviews, eligible refusals, eligible non-response, eligible no resolution, plus the proportion of eligibility (number of eligible households divided by the number of eligible household plus the number of households determined to be ineligible) multiplied by refusals, non-response, and no resolution cases where eligibility is not known plus the estimate of working numbers falling in the no resolution, unknown working status category.

The cooperation rate determines the rate of cooperation among eligible units (known working telephone numbers in the sample). The cooperation rate (62.2\%) is calculated by dividing the number of interviews (completed, partially completed, and screen-out interviews) by the number of interviews plus the number of non-interviews (refusals, non-response, and no resolution working telephone numbers). The cooperation rate is similar to the response rate, but it omits those numbers with an unknown working status.

The refusal rate is calculated similar to the response rates. Refusal rate 1A (23.9\%) is
calculated by dividing the number of refusals (both eligible and unknown eligibility) by the sum of

the number of interviews (completed, partially completed, and screen-out interviews), the number of non-interviews (refusals, non-response, and no resolution working telephone numbers), and the number of all telephone numbers where working status is unknown. Refusal rate 1B (28.5\%) is calculated using the estimate that only $10 \%$ of the no resolution, unknown working status telephone numbers are valid working numbers.

Analyzing the response rates for the various levels of pre-incentives shows that all approaches increased the response rate. Table 6 also shows the response, cooperation, and refusal rates for each pre-notification incentive group. There is a difference of $15-23 \%$ in response rates between those that were sent pre-notification letters with $\$ 2$ and those that were not sent prenotification letter or incentive.

Table 7 shows the effects of letters and incentives sent as a method of converting refusals for the first three waves of sample. The pre-notification system was not utilized until wave four of the sample, so after respondents from the first three waves initially refused, their telephone numbers were reverse matched. All of these matches were then sent a pre-notification letter or a prenotification letter and a $\$ 2$ bill as an attempt to convert the refusals. Converting refusals was more successful when they were sent some type of pre-notification; there was a 6-20\% difference between converting refusals who did not receive any type of refusal conversion pre-notification and those who did. The $\$ 2$ incentive, however, did not appear to have any more of an effect than the pre-notification letter alone.

Representativeness. To understand how attrition affected our panel sample, the 1980 characteristics of the individuals interviewed in 2000 were compared with the characteristics of the entire sample in 1980. For comparisons with intermediate waves, the reader may consult "Marital Instability Over the Life Course Methodology Report and Code book for Fifth Wave Panel Study, 1998." The left half of Table 8 shows the comparisons in characteristics among the original 1980 panel respondents and the 1980 characteristics of the panel respondents re-interviewed in 2000. The right half of table 8 shows the comparisons in current characteristics of the remaining panel respondents interviewed in 2000 and the current characteristics of the 2000 comparison sample, made up of persons nationwide that would have been eligible for the original 1980 cross-section.

In general, the characteristics of those we were able to re-interview in 2000 are similar to those in the 1980 sample. Attrition did occur in predictable categories, namely; those who were in the youngest and oldest age categories, blacks, males, renters, those households where the husband did not have any college education, southern residents, and those residing in metropolitan areas. In all cases the differences are very slight, most less than $4 \%$.

The comparison of the 2000 current panel characteristics with the 2000 comparison sample suggests that most basic demographic characteristics are similar in both data sets (Table 8). The characteristic suggesting the greatest bias is single person households; the comparison sample suggests that the number of one person households is $9.2 \%$ higher than the panel data suggest. This may suggest that attrition has been highest among panel respondents who are living alone. There are differences in representation of the southern region (9.6\%) and metropolitan areas (12.1\%); however, it is important to note that the percentages used to characterize the 2000 panel is drawn from the 1980 data because region and metropolitan residence were not determined for panel respondents re-interviewed in 2000. It is possible that some panel respondents have moved during the past 20 years; however, the trend of decreased representation among those living in the southern

region and in metropolitan areas was also illustrated in the comparison of the 1980 sample characteristics with the current panel respondents' 1980 characteristics. Similar to the difference in husband's education found in the 1980 characteristic comparison, the 2000 data comparison suggests that the representation of college educated husbands is higher (9\%) in the panel data than the comparison sample. Nearly all of the remaining differences between the 2000 panel data and the 2000 comparison sample data are less than $5 \%$.

Logistic analysis was used to test whether some demographic and marital quality variables affect the probability of not being included in the sixth wave of interviews. Two analyses are shown in table 9. The top panel tests whether 1997 demographic characteristics affect the probability of a re-interview in 2000. All of the variables were entered into the equation at the same time. None of the 1997 demographic variables had significant effects on the probability of a re-interview in 2000.

The bottom panel shows the effect of five 1997 marital quality indicators on the probability of being re-interviewed in 2000 while controlling for respondent's age, gender, tenure, and
education, as well as whether children were present in the household. Each marital quality variable was estimated separately. None of the 1997 variables significantly predicted a re-interview in 2000. These results suggest that obtained estimates will not be biased against any particular group, and any conclusions made from the sample will, for the most part, be representative of the target population.

To understand the factors that influenced whether or not an offspring interview was obtained, we used logistic regression to test whether 1997 parent demographic and marital quality variables affected the probability of a re-interview. The top panel of table 10 shows the influence of the demographic factors and in the bottom panel, the influence of the quality of the parent's marriage. Again, each of the marital quality variables were estimated separately.

Variables that had a significant effect on re-interview were age of interviewed parent, parental marital interaction, and parents' marital instability. Based on offspring's parental
characteristics, we were less likely to obtain an offspring interview of younger adult panel respondents, adult respondents with less marital interaction, and adult respondents with more unstable marriages.

The new cross-section sample was intended to be representative of married persons (living with their spouse) between the ages of 19 and 55 . The sample was limited to persons living in households within the contiguous United States and having telephones. This representation is a replicate of the designated population in the original 1980 cross-section. Weighting was applied to the original 1980 sample with regard to region and metropolitan residence; however, since we were able to access more accurate representations of people fitting in this population for 1980, a new weight was created for the 1980 sample to make it more accurately represented. In addition, a weight was created for the 2000 cross-section. Table 11 shows the representativeness of U.S. married persons under the age of 55 according to the Current Population Surveys for both 1980 and 2000. In addition, the table shows the representativeness of both the 1980 and 2000 cross-sections samples before and after weighting.

The samples were evaluated on the following characteristics: age, race, sex, household size, tenure, education, region, presence of children, and metropolitan residence. To make the 1980 cross-section more accurately representative, a new weight was created. The final weight consisted of weighting by the number of adults in the household, sex of respondent, race of respondent, education of respondent, metropolitan residence, age of respondent, household size, and then by race again. A weight was also created for the 2000 cross-section; it consisted of weighting by the number of adults in the household, sex of respondent, race of respondent, education of respondent, presence of children in the household, region, age of respondent, race a second time, household size, and then by region again. After applying the weights, all characteristics are within $2.9 \%$ of the representations offered by the Current Population Survey, with most characteristics within $1 \%$.

Management of the Study. The procedures for managing the study were almost identical to those used in 1997 and 1992. Computer aided interviewing was again used in 2000. The process of managing the interviewers and the interviews, the quality control measures through verification, methods for data cleaning, data entry and coding were the same, as were the procedures for merging the adult and offspring data with the first five waves. The reader may want to consult the wave four methodology report for details.

Lists of responses to open ended items are shown in Appendix K. Scales for key variables were constructed in much the same manner as in prior years. How they were constructed can be found in Appendix L, and their frequency distributions appear in Appendices F, G, H, and I. Appendix E shows the skip patterns used for the adult panel and cross-section/comparison surveys by showing the eligibility requirements for each question included on the surveys. A list of the variables in the merged panel file and in the cross-section/comparison files is contained in Appendix M, and a list of study staff may be found in Appendix B.

## RESEARCH PLAN

## A. SPECIFIC AIMS

A generation ago, marital change was reaching its stride. Over the last 20 years, some aspects of family life have stabilized (such as the high divorce rate), while others have continued to change (such as the employment of married mothers with young children). Considerable debate centers on whether this flux has influenced the quality of American marriages. The results of the proposed study will inform this debate. The first aim of the proposed study is to evaluate whether marital quality has remained the same, improved, or declined between 1980 and 2000, and to delineate the factors that account for this change. Preliminary evidence suggests that marital and family changes have the potential to affect the health and longevity of the middle-aged and elderly--a rapidly growing segment of the U.S. population. However, only a few aspects of marriage and family life have been studied, and the mechanisms at work are not well understood. The results of the proposed study will provide a comprehensive picture of the impact of family and marital history on health. The second aim is to assess the extent to which family-of-origin characteristics and marital history erode or enhance people's physical health and psychological well-being over the life course, and to specify the mechanisms at work. Much of our knowledge of the life course comes from longitudinal research. Yet, we know relatively little about how panel attrition affects the veracity of our findings, or how to correct for attrition bias. The third aim is to understand how differences in people's histories affect whether they leave longitudinal studies, assess the extent to which attrition affects study findings, and develop ways to adjust for attrition bias. Finally, the proposed investigation builds on a unique research asset. The Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study is one of the longest running national studies of marriage in existence, and the only one with detailed information on marital quality and interaction. By expanding the period of study to 20 years, the addition of a sixth wave of data will significantly increase the value of this public use data set. Consequently, the fourth aim is to enhance the value of the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study by collecting additional data.

To achieve these aims, we propose to build on the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study, which began in 1980 as a national survey of 2,033 married persons under age 55 (Booth et al., 1991). These individuals were interviewed four additional times between 1983 and 1997. To achieve the first aim (studying changes in marital quality), we will replicate the original 1980 survey in the year 2000; this will require interviewing a new cross-section of 2,000 married persons under the age of 55 in that year. To achieve the second aim (understanding how family and marital history affects health), we will interview the original sample a sixth time. In addition to repeating the core of longitudinal questions, we will add new items dealing with health to the interview schedule. To achieve the third aim (understanding attrition bias in longitudinal research), we will supplement the new cross-section with additional respondents between the ages 38 and 75 who had been married in 1980. Comparing the sixth wave of data with the new cross-section will allow a detailed analysis of attrition bias. Finally, our focus on health (aim 2) is but one of many topics that researchers could investigate with 6-wave panel data. In general, the availability of six waves of data over a 20-year period, combined with a new cross-section, will achieve our fourth aim (to enhance the value and usefulness of our data set for other researchers).

## B. BACKGROUND AND SIGNIFICANCE

## Theoretical Orientation

The life course perspective is a major theoretical orientation in family studies, and provides an organizing framework for our research. This perspective is concerned not only with changes that occur as people age, but also with the manner in which historical change in the larger society affects the lives of individuals (Bengtson and Allen, 1994). According to Elder (1994), the life course perspective has four central themes.

First, the life course perspective considers families in their historical context. In the proposed study, by comparing a new cross-section of married individuals in the year 2000 with the original 1980 cross-section, we will be able to estimate the effects of large-scale social change on the quality and stability of marriage. Between 1980 and 2000, the proportion of wives and mothers in the paid labor force grew (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1996), women experienced real increases in earned income (Spain and Bianchi, 1996), the percentage of poor families increased (Zill and Nord, 1994), and attitudes toward divorce became more accepting (Thornton, 1989). Yet, we know surprisingly little about the impact of these changes on the quality and stability of marriage. It is possible, for example, that as the number of dual-earner couples has increased, work-family conflict has raised the overall level of tension in marriage. Another possibility is that the growing social acceptance of divorce has lowered the threshold of marital happiness required for people to think about and initiate steps toward divorce. In our research, we plan to relate the behavior and experiences of married individuals to changes in the larger society during this 20-year period.

Second, the life course perspective focuses attention on the timing and sequencing of events. In relation to the new cross-section, we intend to see how changes in the timing and sequencing of events, such as cohabitation, first birth, and age at marriage between 1980 and 2000, have affected the quality and stability of marriage. Compared with earlier marriage cohorts, recent cohorts are more likely to cohabit prior to marriage, have a child prior to marriage, and marry at older ages. It is not clear, however, how changes in the timing and sequencing of family events, taken together, have affected marriage.

In relation to the longitudinal component of the proposed study, we also plan to examine the timing and sequencing of events, such as divorce. Divorces that occur when individuals are in their 20s, compared with divorces that occur when individuals are in their 40s, may have less effect on the quality of second marriages and on later life health and well-being. People divorcing in their 20s are likely to be dissolving short-term marriages and have good remarriage prospects, whereas people divorcing in their 40s are likely to be dissolving long-term marriages and have poorer remarriage prospects. Moreover, whether the divorce follows the birth of children determines if the second marriage entails a stepfamily relationship-a factor known to affect the quality of family relationships and the stability of remarriages (White and Booth, 1985).

Third, the life course perspective emphasizes the interdependence of lives over time. Although early research tended to emphasize the influence of parents on children, it also is true that children influence parents--an idea we intend to explore in our study. For example, in relation to the new year 2000 cross-section, we intend to see if factors such as increases in premarital fertility and the presence of stepchildren in families are responsible for shifts in marital quality during the last 20 years.

The longitudinal component will allow us to consider whether parents’ decisions to divorce have consequences for offspring that persist across the entire life course. We know that
young adult children of divorced parents are more likely to see their own marriages end in divorce, attain lower levels of socioeconomic status, and have poorer psychological well-being (Amato and Booth, 1997). However, it is not clear if the consequences of parental divorce persist into offspring's later years. Our research will examine various dimensions of respondents' health and well-being in the middle and later years in relation to their childhood family structure.

Finally, the life course perspective views individuals as being active rather than passive. Consequently, we do not see peoples’ marriages as being shaped in a deterministic fashion by forces beyond their control. Instead, we see large-scale changes (such as shifts in the economy or the law) as contextual variables that create opportunities as well as constraints. Within this context, people make choices about marriage and family life at pivotal points in their lives. Indeed, many of the factors noted above, including those relating to the timing and duration of events (premarital cohabitation, age at marriage) result from the choices people make. Because we have always been guided by this assumption, we include a large number of items in our study that measure people's attitudes, perceptions, preferences, and decisions.

Moreover, although individuals may grow up in troubled families, they often manage to have healthy marriages and satisfying personal lives. In contrast, others growing up in troubled families have a lifetime of unhappy marriages and transitory cohabitation experiences. In the later years, long-term outcomes may be related to whether individuals have made good decisions about forming intimate relationships and have acquired useful relationship skills. The longitudinal component of the proposed study will allow us to explore these ideas.

## Aim One: Changes in Marital Quality Between 1980-2000

Following a period of stable divorce rates during the post-World War II period and the 1950s, the divorce rate began to increase during the early 1960s. It doubled during the 1970s, then leveled off during the 1980s at a historically high level. Currently, about one-half of all first marriages are expected to end in divorce (Cherlin, 1992). The increased rate of divorce may reflect the fact that it is easier now than in the past to leave unhappy marriages due to increasingly tolerant community attitudes, the introduction of no-fault divorce, and the growing economic independence of women. Alternatively, it is possible that the increase in divorce reflects a deterioration in the quality of marriage since the early 1960s.

Marital quality may have declined during this historical period for several reasons. First, marital relationships may have been affected by the drop in men's real wages since the early 1970s. This drop was due to declines in manufacturing, mining, and construction industries and corresponding increases in unemployment and underemployment (Hernandez, 1993; Zill and Nord, 1994). Second, dramatic increases in labor force participation among mothers of young children have increased the potential for work-family conflict (U.S. Bureau of the Census, Fig. 21, 1992). The employment of both spouses creates difficulties in managing time and finding suitable child care. Moreover, conflict over the household division of labor is a cause of tension in many marriages (Hochschild, 1989). Third, both women and men--but particularly women-have become less traditional in their gender role attitudes since the late 1960s (Thornton, 1989); this change has increased the likelihood of disagreements over gender roles within marriage. Fourth, expectations for marriage have risen at the same time that the number of single people in the population has increased (due to later marriage and divorce). Unmet expectations, combined with the availability of alternative partners, may undermine people's commitment to making their current marriages work (Glenn, 1996). Finally, some observers argue that there has been a growth of individualistic values and a decline in support for the norm of life-long marriage in American culture (Bellah, Madsen, Sullivan, Swidler, and Tipton, 1985; Popenoe, 1988). Because divorce is readily available, spouses with an individualistic orientation may invest
relatively little effort in resolving disagreements, thus eroding relationship quality. Each of these factors may have made marriage a more difficult and less secure arrangement than it was several decades ago.

However, other changes since the 1960s, such as increases in education, increases in age at first marriage, and declines in marital fertility (Bumpass, Martin, and Sweet, 1991; U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1992) may have improved marital quality. Indeed, these changes may have offset some of the decline suggested above, or even resulted in a net improvement in the quality of marriage.

How has marital quality changed, overall, during the last few decades? Some limited evidence supports the argument that marital quality has declined. Using merged data from the General Social Survey, Glenn (1991) demonstrated that the percentage of people reporting that their marriages were "very happy" dropped gradually from 1973 to 1988. This is the opposite of what one would expect if the rise in divorce were due only to the more frequent ending of unhappy marriages. If divorce removes poor marriages from the pool of married couples, then remaining marriages should be happier now, on average, than in the past.

Similarly, using data from the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study, Rogers and Amato (1997) compared data from two groups: the sample of original respondents (interviewed in 1980) and the sample of adult offspring of the original respondents (interviewed in 1992). Two samples were constructed for the analysis: 914 married individuals from the original sample who were between 20 and 35 years of age in 1980 (mean age $=27.2$ ), and 154 married individuals from the offspring sample who were between 20 and 35 years of age in 1992 (mean age $=27.2$ ). These two groups represented distinct marriage cohorts: Those in the older cohort had married between 1969 and 1980, whereas those in the younger cohort had married between 1981 and 1992. The samples were constructed so that none of the individuals in the older cohort were parents of people in the younger cohort. For the older sample, all variables were measured in 1980; for the younger sample, all variables were measured in 1992.

Rogers and Amato (1997) found significant differences between the two marriage cohorts in three of five dimensions of marital quality. The younger cohort, compared with the older cohort, reported lower levels of marital interaction and higher levels of marital conflict and marital problems. (The younger cohort, however, did not report lower levels of marital happiness or greater divorce proneness.) Controlling for age at marriage and education did not change the pattern, suggesting that increases in age at marriage and education did little to offset the cohort difference. Additional analyses were carried out in which explanatory variables were entered into regression models. These analyses indicated that much of the decline in marital quality could be accounted for by increased economic hardship (as reflected in greater use of public assistance), greater work-family conflict (due to a rise in the number of dual-earner couples with preschool- aged children), less traditional attitudes toward gender roles among wives (but not among husbands), and more premarital cohabitation. Overall, these results are consistent with the belief that recent marriage cohorts are experiencing more difficulty than earlier marriage cohorts in adapting to a rapidly changing social climate.

In the proposed study, we will compare marital quality in the 1980 and 2000 crosssections. Scales are available to measure five dimensions of marital quality: happiness, interaction, problems, disagreements, and divorce proneness. These data will contribute to four separate but related research projects.

Changes in the level of marital quality. The first project will focus on changes in the level of marital quality between 1980 and 2000 . We will begin by comparing the mean scores across the two time periods. (For exploratory purposes, we will analyze the data for husbands
and wives separately.) Assuming that differences in marital quality are observed, the next step will be to explain these differences. We will begin by controlling for age, age at marriage, number of children, education, race, and marriage order. It may be that marriages in 1980 and 2000 differ in quality, but only because the two groups are differently constituted. Assuming that differences in marital quality persist, the next step will be to assess the role of several explanatory factors, including economic stress (men's and women's earnings, periods of unemployment, use of public assistance, perceptions of economic hardship), work-family conflict (dual-earner couples with preschool children), husband's and wife’s gender role attitudes, the proportion of housework and child care performed by husbands, prior cohabitation, premarital births, and attitudes toward the acceptability of divorce. These variables will be introduced into regression models to determine the extent to which they account for differences in marital quality across the two groups.

Changes in the determinants of marital quality. The second project will focus on changes in the determinants of marital quality between 1980 and 2000. Social change during this time suggests that certain features of marriage may have become more or less important in affecting marital quality. For example, as wives have entered the labor force, many people's views about marriage have become more egalitarian (Thornton, 1989). Many employed wives now expect their husbands to share family work equally--an expectation that many husbands fail to meet. Consequently, the household division of labor has become a salient and contentious issue among many married couples (Hochschild, 1989). These considerations suggest the hypothesis that husbands' share of housework and child care is a better predictor of wives' marital quality in 2000 than in 1980. A second example refers to wives’ income. Earlier, wives’ income posed a threat to many husbands--especially traditional men who accepted the breadwinner ethic (Blumstein and Schwartz, 1984). More recently, however, as dual-earner families have become normative and as people have come to recognize that two incomes are necessary to raise a family in comfort, it is likely that wives' income has become more highly valued by husbands. Indeed, studies show that women's education, employment, and income increase their chances on the marriage market (Oppenheimer, 1994). Consistent with this reasoning, Greenstein (1990) found that wives' income was negatively associated with divorce, presumably because it eased economic strain. These considerations suggest the hypothesis that wives' income is negatively associated with marital quality in 1980 but positively associated with marital quality in 2000. These and other hypotheses will be tested by including interaction terms in regression models. For example, the first hypothesis described above would involve three variables--decade of survey, husbands' housework, and decade x husbands' housework--to predict dimensions of marital quality.

Changes in the relationship between marital quality and subjective well-being. The third project will focus on changes in the relationship between marital quality and subjective wellbeing between 1980 and 2000. Some observers have argued that marriage is becoming a weaker institution (Popenoe, 1988), and one less able to meet people's needs for happiness (Glenn, 1996). Consistent with these ideas, Glenn and Weaver (1981) found, using repeated crosssections from the annual General Social Survey, that the association between marriage and personal happiness is becoming weaker. Similarly, Hochschild (1997) found that as family life has become more hectic and stressful, many people are now viewing the workplace as a refuge from family life. These considerations suggest the hypothesis that marital quality is a poorer predictor of subjective well-being in 2000 than in 1980. Correspondingly, we will be able to test the hypothesis that employment and work satisfaction are better predictors of subjective wellbeing in 2000 than in 1980. To assess subjective well-being, our survey includes data on life
happiness, psychological distress, and perceived health.
Changes in the association between marital happiness and commitment to marriage. The fourth project will focus on changes in the association between marital happiness and commitment to marriage. During the last several decades, people's expectations for marriage appear to have changed (Amato and Booth, 1997; Glenn, 1996). In the past, marriage offered many benefits to people: a desirable social status, a specialized division of labor between husbands and wives, and a secure environment in which to raise children. Given these benefits, it is likely that many people remained committed to their marriages even if they were unsatisfied with certain aspects of the marital relationship. Their commitment was almost certainly reinforced by the negative views toward divorce held by most people. Today, however, the status of marriage is lower, most spouses share the breadwinner role, and childbearing and child rearing frequently take place outside of marriage. In contrast to earlier eras, many people now marry primarily for personal reasons-- that is, to attain a high level of self-fulfillment and emotional intimacy with their partners. In addition, during the last several decades, attitudes toward divorce have become more liberal (Thornton, 1989). Higher expectations for the marital relationship, combined with wider acceptance of divorce, suggest that the threshold of marital unhappiness at which people begin to think about and initiate steps toward divorce has become lower in recent decades. We will test this notion by examining associations between our marital happiness scale and items dealing with people's divorce-related behavior, including thinking about divorce, talking with one's spouse about divorce, discussing divorce with friends or family, and having a trial separation. Our hypothesis is that a lower level of marital happiness is required to trigger divorce-related behaviors in 2000 than in 1980.

## Aim Two: Family-of-Origin, Marital History, and the Health and Well-being of the Middle-Aged and Elderly

The availability of six waves of data makes it possible to answer a large number of questions about marriage and family over the life course. In this proposal, we develop a set of questions dealing with the influence of family and marital history on the health and subjective well-being of the middle-aged and elderly. We focus on these two stages of the life course because almost all of our original respondents (first interviewed in 1980) will have reached age 40 by the year 2000, and our oldest respondents will be 75 . We focus on health because concerns about physical well-being become increasingly salient as people age. In addition, the elderly, compared with young adults, are somewhat more likely to experience depression and some other psychological problems. Our data set contains rich information about the quality and stability of people's marriages, as well as their parents' marriages. Consequently, we will use this opportunity to investigate the manner in which characteristics of the family-of-origin and people's marital histories are related to health and well-being in later life.

In relation to the family of origin, parental divorce is associated with lowered offspring longevity by as much as four years (Schwartz et al., 1995; Tucker et al., 1997). There is also evidence suggesting that parental divorce adversely affects offsprings' marital quality and psychological well-being in early adulthood (Amato and Booth, 1991, 1997). Low marital quality among continuously-married parents appears to have similar effects (Amato and Booth, 1991). In relation to one's own marital history, divorce appears to have an adverse effect on men's and women's longevity, even if they remarry (Tucker et al., 1996). This appears to be true with predivorce health status controlled. Some studies suggest that the effects of divorce on depression and anxiety are short-lived (Booth and Amato, 1991). In contrast, other studies suggest that adjustment to divorce occurs primarily among those who remarry or repartner; the psychological consequences of divorce may linger indefinitely among those who remain single
(Johnson and Wu, 1997). Among those who are married, poor marital quality is associated with low subjective well-being (Benin and Nienstedt, 1985; Glenn and Weaver, 1981). And although rarely considered in previous research, a history of vacillating marital happiness also may be problematic. In addition, other life course events, such as premarital childbearing, premarital cohabitation, and age at marriage, may have long-term consequences for people's health and well-being. These considerations suggest that a new analysis of known stress points in people's family and marital histories has the potential to add to our knowledge about physical health and psychological well-being. Previous research, however, has rarely addressed these issues among older populations.

The life-course model guiding our study is shown in Figure 1. The family-of-origin may have a direct long-term effect on health and psychological well-being. In addition, some of the effect may operate through individuals’ own marital histories (including the quality and stability of their marriages). For example, parental divorce and remarriage not only increase the chances of divorce among adult offspring (Amato, 1996), but also predict low marital quality (Amato and Booth, 1991, 1997). Another indirect path may operate through income and financial wellbeing. For example, studies show that parental divorce and stepfamily formation predict lower educational attainment and income in adulthood (Amato and Booth, 1997). Educational attainment and income, in turn, are related to health and mortality (Crimmins et al., 1996; Hayward et al., 1997; ) The proximate mechanisms through which family-of-origin history, marital history, and financial well-being are thought to influence health are (a) an orderly life style and (b) "mattering." (We describe these two constructs below.)

Family-of-origin history. As noted earlier, a history of parental divorce increases the risk of a variety of negative outcomes for adult offspring, including poor marital quality, divorce, and psychological problems. A recent analysis indicates that divorces that occur when children are younger (prior to the teen years) have more negative implications for socioeconomic attainment and psychological well-being than those that occur when children are older (Amato and Booth, 1997)--a factor we will take into account in our analysis. In relation to remarriage, children who live in stepfamilies leave home earlier, often for reasons of family conflict (White, 1994). Moreover, they are less likely to attend college, less likely to receive assistance from parents if they do attend college, and more likely to marry early (White, 1994). We assume that living in a stepfamily as a child lowers educational achievement. When early age at marriage is a consequence of living in a stepfamily, we expect it to increase the risk of offspring divorce (Booth and Edwards, 1985). Another relevant family-of-origin characteristic is the quality of the parents' marriage. Conflict between parents, even in marriages that do not end in divorce, appears to lower offsprings' later marital quality (Amato and Booth, 1997). In addition, interparental conflict is related to less community integration and social support among adult offspring (Amato and Booth, 1997), and research indicates that low social support is associated with less cardiovascular, endocrine, and immune system robustness (Uchino et al., 1996).

Marital history. Under the general category of marital history, we include events such as premarital birth and premarital cohabitation. Some research has shown premarital childbearing to lower the stability of subsequent marriages (Teachman, 1983), mostly because of its relation to limited education, early age at marriage, and cohabitation (Bumpass et al., 1991). Premarital cohabitation is negatively related to marital quality and positively related to divorce (Booth and Johnson, 1988). Cohabitors are more likely than noncohabitors to engage in risky or deviant behavior, and hence, may be poor marriage material. Furthermore, cohabitors tend to have a lower commitment to the norm of life-long marriage (Thomson and Colella, 1992). However, there is also evidence that the experience of cohabitation may lower people's commitment to
marriage even more (Axinn and Barber, 1997). We anticipate that premarital childbearing and premarital cohabitation, through affecting the quality and stability of later marriages, have longterm implications for health.

Another relevant factor may be whether the individual marries into a stepfamily. People who marry into a stepfamily are more likely to have weak ties with parents and in-laws, are more willing to leave the marriage, and are more likely to be in age-heterogamous marriages; each of these factors is associated with lower marital quality and a greater likelihood of divorce (Booth and Edwards, 1992). However, the remarriage of a middle-aged or elderly person may have salubrious effects. The first few years of marriage, in particular, are typically characterized by high marital quality, which may convey positive health benefits (VanLanigham et al., 1997).

In general, having children does not improve parents' marital quality. In fact, the relationship between number of children and parents' marital quality is generally negative (Abbott and Brody, 1985); this is partly because children delay the divorce of unhappy couples (White et al., 1986). If there is a divorce, parent-adult child relations are often characterized by estrangement (Booth and Amato, 1994), especially between children and their fathers. Single parenting can be particularly stressful (McLanahan and Sandefur, 1994). Later in life, adult children's instrumental support of parents is strongly related to the quality of parent-child relationships while offspring are still in the home (Whitbeck et al., 1994). Finally, the number of children is related to the amount of support parents provide to children when they are young; in general, the more children, the lower the level of help given (Hogan et al., 1993). Whether parent-child relationships are related to the quality of parents' marriages in later life is not clearly established. However, there is evidence that stressful parent-child relations increase elderly parents' depression, a major indicator of well-being (Pillemer and Suitor, 1991).

Marital quality is integral to health and well-being (Gove et al., 1983; Loomis and Booth, 1995). Marital satisfaction is known to be associated with high morale in later life (Lee, 1978), and older persons who confide in their spouse have higher levels of marital satisfaction and score higher on indicators of emotional well-being (Lee, 1988). The effects of variation in marital quality over time, however, are not well understood. In the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study, among those who started with high marital quality in 1980, about two-fifths remained high over the next 12 years. In contrast, about one-third reported a substantial decline that persisted over two or more waves. The remaining respondents reported vacillating marital quality. Among those who started with low marital quality in 1980, about one-third increased the quality of their marriage and hung on to the improved ratings through 1992. Another third remained low, and the remaining third vacillated. With the additional data from the next wave, we will be able to fine-tune these patterns of change. We hypothesize that a protracted period of low marital quality will reduce health and well-being, as will vacillating patterns. Whether couples who experience increases in marital quality for an extended period realize health benefits is an open question. Finally, our analysis will be mindful of the possibility of the reverse ordering of these factors--declines in health can erode feelings of mattering and thereby marital quality (Booth and Johnson 1994; Friedman 1991).

Economic well-being. A third set of variables reflect economic well-being. In relation to the family of origin, growing up in a single-parent family or a stepfamily can decrease opportunities for education; a low level of education, in turn, decreases later life income. In relation to one's own marital history, divorce can lower personal income, especially for women (McLanahan and Sandefur, 1994). It is also true, however, that low income is sometimes a cause of divorce (White, 1990), so the relationship between economic well-being and marital history is reciprocal. Low income, even if it is only temporary, interferes with the accumulation of assets,
which may adversely influence economic resources available during the middle and later stages of the life course. Furthermore, research has consistently shown income to be positively related to health (Kessler, 1982) and mortality (Lillard and Waite, 1995).

Proximate mechanisms. Research on the relationship between marital status and health suggests relational qualities as potential mechanisms worth exploring. Married persons enjoy greater physical health and psychological well-being than divorced or single individuals (Joung et al., 1997; Umberson, 1987; Verbrugge, 1979). They are less likely to rate their health as being poor, report fewer chronic and acute conditions, and have fewer days of activity restricted due to health (Anson 1989). Moreover, they are less likely than single people to report depression and symptoms of psychological distress (Gove et al., 1983). What is it about marriage that translates into better health and well-being? We believe that Rosenberg and McCullough's (1981) concept of mattering may help to explain the link between marriage and health. Two components of mattering hold the most promise: importance and dependence. Importance is the extent to which individuals believe that their spouse cares about what they want, think, and do. Dependence is the extent to which individuals believe that their spouse is dependent upon them and have a sense of responsibility for their welfare. Rosenberg and McCullough present data showing that mattering is positively related to self-esteem, and negatively related to depression and deviance in adolescents. Ross and Mirowsky (1989) find that adults who believe that their spouse cares for them have lower depression and fewer psychological symptoms--a finding consistent with the concept of mattering. Research showing that psychological well-being enhances physical health is extensive (Aneshensel and Huba, 1983), so we assume that if mattering explains the marriagemental health link, then it will play a similar role in the marriage-physical health relationship.

A second mechanism suggested by the marital status and health literature is that marriage results in health benefits because spouses provide an organized lifestyle. This lifestyle includes getting enough sleep, a balanced diet, and exercise; it also involves fewer behaviors that are detrimental to health, such as drinking, using drugs, driving fast, and failing to wear seat belts (Gove, 1973; Umberson, 1987). Through monitoring one another's behavior, spouses ensure that their partners engage in behaviors that maximize health and minimize risk. Spouses can also give care when individuals are recovering from an illness (Waltz et al., 1988; Waltz, 1986).

Although not included in the model in Figure 1, there is always a possibility that selection may be at work. In particular, some individuals may have personality features that make them incapable of forming sustained intimate relationships. For example, Booth and Edwards (1992) found that remarried individuals have more personality traits that create problems in marriages than do people in first marriages. (These traits include getting angry easily, having feelings that are easily hurt, and being jealous, domineering, or critical.) Furthermore, these personality features are the only qualities found to carry over from one marriage to the next among people who divorce and remarry (Johnson and Booth, in press). McLeod (1995) found that men and women with psychiatric disorders (alcohol or drug dependence and anxiety disorders) were much more likely than those without those ailments to marry individuals who had the same disorder. These marriages are likely to be unstable and unhappy--the type least likely to be characterized by mattering and an orderly lifestyle. One study found that people who marry at a young age (18 and under) are twice as likely as those who marry at an older age to have psychiatric disorders (Forthofer et al., 1996). Early personality problems may be carried forward into adult life through a process of cumulative continuity whereby individuals create environments that reinforce and sustain these characteristics (Caspi et al., 1987). All of these studies suggest the possibility of a selection effect that would predispose people to be part of problematic families and marriages that would affect their later life health
and well-being. The selection mechanism may operate directly or through mattering. In this analysis, we will attempt to account for selection effects by controlling for personality attributes (noted above) that can erode family and marital relations.

Analytic strategies. Our analytic strategy will be to estimate the impact of family-oforigin experiences and work forward in time. We will examine the association between variables such as parental divorce, parental remarriage, and parents' marital quality, and our measures of health and psychological well-being. We will then consider the extent to which these associations are mediated by aspects of marital history, financial well-being, mattering, and an orderly lifestyle. For example, do parental divorces have a direct effect on health in the middle and later years, or is their effect mediated by marital quality and stability in the second generation? When a relationship or a pattern of relationships is observed, we will systematically examine the role of the linking mechanisms described earlier to determine which ones account for the relationship.

Throughout the course of the longitudinal study, we have obtained four measures of physical health and five measures of psychological well-beingwhich will enable us to assess whether health deteriorates faster among those with adverse family and marital backgrounds than those without. However, to fully explore the hypotheses, we will add a number of other health measures to the 6th wave interview. Moreover, information on the respondents' parents' age at death (if deceased) and the respondents' ratings of their parents' health (if living) will allow a rough adjustment for genetic factors that influence the respondents' health. Finally, we estimate that by the year 2000, 110 respondents will have died. This will allow us to examine the effect of family and marital experience on mortality.

There is ample evidence that women suffer economically while men go relatively unscathed following divorce (McLanahan and Booth, 1989). Moreover, while women live longer than men, they report poorer general health, more chronic conditions, and more long-term limitations on their activities due to health reasons; in contrast, men report more injuries (Verbrugge, 1988). In an extensive study of sex differences in depression and other indicators of psychological well-being, Mirowsky and Ross (1995) report that women's higher reports of distress are not due to measurement or other methodological problems, but the fact that women are actually more distressed. Therefore, in the proposed analysis we will continuously check for gender differences in the relationship between marital/family history and health/well-being.

The product of this phase of the proposed research is a delineation of features of the family-of-origin and marital experiences (singly and in concert) that adversely affect physical health and psychological well-being. Our goal is to assemble family life trajectories that are most damaging as well as those that are most beneficial. Furthermore, we will pay special attention to those individuals whose experiences put them at risk but are in good health. As a final step, we will compare the health and well-being of the married persons in the sample with those who are divorced, permanently separated, or widowed--people identified prior research by as least healthy. Our interest is in seeing if the health of married persons with poor family and marital histories reach the levels of these subpopulations.

## Aim Three: Sample Attrition and the Integrity of Results in Family Research

Multiple wave panel studies provide a number of advantages for the family researcher studying how marriages change over the life course. These include the ability to follow changes in the same individuals over multiple life transitions and to develop models of patterns of life course changes at the individual level that would not be possible with cross-sectional or twowave data. The data from such studies also fit well into the recently developed analysis methods such as pooled time-series models, latent growth curve models, and hierarchical linear models
which can provide powerful and valid inferences about the patterns of change.
A major problem with multiple-wave studies that extend over many years is panel attrition. If this attrition is differential relative to important variables in the substantive problems being investigated, then there is a real possibility of biased results. While methodological tools have been developed to assess the degree of attrition bias and correct for it, these tools have been found to have statistical problems when applied to the type of data available in many research applications involving survey data. Because no single tool for assessing attrition bias is free of problems, a strategy that has been proposed is to use a variety of different approaches to evaluate the extent to which the findings are biased by attrition (Stolzenberg and Relles, 1997). A major aim of the proposed research is to apply several approaches to identifying and adjusting for possible biases in the multiple-wave Marital Instability panel study.

The Marital Instability panel study extends over a large portion of the marital life course, is based on a national sample of individuals, and includes detailed information on marital quality and process. For these reasons, it is an important resource for family researchers. It is important, therefore, that the consequences of sample attrition be evaluated as completely as possible. The objective of this research will be to collect additional data and apply a series of techniques to the panel data to evaluate the extent of selection bias from several different perspectives. Making these data and findings available to other family researchers will allow them to more accurately assess the presence, nature, and extent of bias introduced by attrition in this and similar multiplewave panel studies.

Over the 17 years of the Marital Instability panel study, there has been substantial attrition (see Table 1). By 1997, $53 \%$ of the respondents to the first wave completed a $5^{\text {th }}$ wave interview. The table below documents the attrition history across the four follow-up waves. The most common sources of attrition were refusal (22\%) and being unable to locate the respondent (17\%). The attrition was greatest in the first follow-up interview (around 22\%) and has decreased in subsequent waves with a loss of less than $10 \%$ from the previous wave in the 1997 follow-up. Based on our experience with the panel, we estimate that the percent of completed interviews in a $6^{\text {th }}$ wave conducted in 2000 will fall below $50 \%$ of the original 1980 panel. The presence of this attrition does not necessarily mean that the findings from the study will be unrepresentative or biased, but it does mean that a careful evaluation of the adequacy of the sample is needed to identify and adjust for differential attrition relative to variables important in the analyses of marital quality and instability over the life course.

It is difficult to evaluate whether the degree of attrition in this panel study is higher or lower than in comparable studies. Since the inception of the panel study, we have used rigorous, state-of-the-art panel tracking methods and survey techniques to maintain the highest quality and most complete sample possible (Booth and Johnson, 1985). While attrition may be slightly lower in some other panel studies, other studies have not involved long periods between waves, used a nationally representative sample of households (obtained from random-digit-dialing techniques), or focused on interviewing the same individual (rather than an informant for the household). Our largest period of attrition--between the first and second waves--largely reflected the problem of locating respondents who refused to provide us with their names or addresses in 1980, making them difficult to track (Booth and Johnson, 1985). Since the 1983 wave, we have been able to locate all but 83 of the respondents. Generally, we believe an analysis of the attrition data demonstrates high compliance, considering the nature of the sample, a national trend towards greater refusals, and the length of the study.

Over the course of the study we have performed a number of analyses to evaluate the differential attrition. Following the collection of each wave of data, we used logistic regression
and probit analyses with attrition as the dependent variable to assess the characteristics of the respondents that may be related to their dropping out of the study. Table 2 of Appendix A shows the percentage distributions of the respondents by 1980 background characteristics for the 1980 and 1997 waves. The distributions are very similar even though certain categories have shown more attrition than others. Table 3 of Appendix A shows the results of logistic regressions predicting non-interview through 1997 with selected demographic and marital quality characteristics. The most consistent predictors of attrition have been background variables such as educational attainment, gender, minority status, renter status, and metropolitan residence, all of which are significantly related to sample attrition. None of the marital quality measures in 1980 were significantly related to attrition over the 17 -year period. Not until the $4^{\text {th }}$ wave did we note a tendency for greater attrition since the previous wave among persons with poorer marital quality. These effects were modest in magnitude and were only noted for marital happiness and divorce proneness. This effect may reflect greater attrition rates among individuals who divorced since their last interview, either because they were more difficult to locate or less willing to continue in the study. The extent to which the effect of divorce proneness on attrition between recent adjacent waves has accumulated over several waves to produce a substantial loss of persons with low marital quality or disrupted marriages is not known and cannot be adequately estimated with available data.

We also have done some preliminary analyses to evaluate whether the rate of marital dissolution observed in the panel approximates the rate that would be expected in the general population in the same age groups. Life table analyses of divorce for persons in their first three years of marriage in 1980 found an estimated dissolution rate of around $35 \%$ over the period of the study, similar to what might be found in the general population for this marital duration group (Johnson and Booth, in press). Direct comparison with vital statistics data is limited by differences in comparison groups and the fact that in the 1980 sample, persons in the first three years of marriage would have already been selective because of the marriages that terminated before the first three years. A better comparison group is needed to evaluate the bias in the relative dissolution rates in this and other marital duration cohorts found in the panel.

Attrition in panel studies can lead to biased estimates of effects if attrition is related to both the independent and dependent variables (Heckman, 1979). For example, having higher attrition among men than women would not bias the effect estimates in regression models that include gender as a control and test for the presence of interaction effects between gender and the major independent variables of interest. Bias in the effect of gender on marital happiness would arise, for example, if men in unhappy marriages had higher attrition than those in happy marriages and this effect was not found for women. Since some important predictor and outcome measures have been found to be associated with attrition, the possibility of bias in the Marital Instability panel is present. The usual tool to adjust for this bias in regression type models is the Heckman two-step procedure (1979). However, recent work points out the limited utility of this method for adjusting for selection bias (Stolzenberg and Relles, 1997). When sample sizes are relatively small, the selection effect is modest, and the selection variables are highly correlated with (or the same as) the independent variables in the prediction models, the two-step method will more likely produce estimates that increase rather than decrease the overall error in the estimates. Because many of these conditions are present in empirical social survey models (similar to the type of models used with the Marital Instability panel data), Heckman's procedure has not been found to be an adequate tool by itself to deal with attrition bias.

Long-term panels pose additional selection problems that cannot be resolved by techniques such as Heckman's, which compare measured characteristics of respondents in the
first wave who did or did not drop out in subsequent waves. The nature of long-term panel studies increases the odds of selecting for persons who lead geographically stable and maritally stable lives. They are more likely to be living in the same place and the social and psychological context that lead them to agree to participate in an initial wave is likely to be in place at later waves. For example, Johnson, Amoloza, and Booth (1992) found, when controlling for measurement error, high stability over a 12-year period in marital quality. Some of this stability may reflect a bias towards more stable individuals remaining in the sample. It is possible that the relationships among the variables observed may be different than those found in a sample that did not select for more stable individuals. For example, measuring the consequences of divorce on mental health may be biased if the individuals undergoing the most traumatic changes stemming from the divorce were least likely to continue in the study. This effect could not be estimated using differences in measured characteristics of respondents and dropouts, because the critical variables (in this case, the nature of the divorce) are unknown and unmeasured, since the disruption occurred following the last interview with the respondents. Because the variables that may best predict attrition are not measured in earlier waves, selection bias cannot be modeled adequately by the first stage of the Heckman procedure; alternative methods of estimating and adjusting for attrition bias are needed.

We propose to do an extensive analysis of the attrition problem using a multiple method approach. Each approach has its limitations but combined should give a reasonably complete picture of the nature and degree of bias that may be present in the Marital Instability panel. The first set of approaches involves a comparison of the respondents in the $6^{\text {th }}$ wave (to be conducted in 2000) with a new cross-sectional sample of respondents (also interviewed in 2000) selected to represent the same cohort interviewed in the first wave of the panel in 1980. Extensive comparison of these two groups will enable us to evaluate if the approximate half of the original study who are still active in the panel are different from a similar group from the same population. One outcome of this comparison may be a set of case weights that investigators can use in weighted analyses that adjust for attrition effects. Another outcome will be the development of age-specific divorce/dissolution rates and marital survival curves for the panel and cross-sectional respondents making use of hazard (life table) models. These will assess the extent to which the panel may have underestimated the dissolution rate and provide evidence of which groups may be most affected by this bias. The second approach involves use of the analytic tools proposed by Stolzenberg and Relles (1997) to investigate the adequacy of the Heckman technique for adjusting for certain types of attrition bias. This should yield a set of guidelines on the efficacy of the Heckman procedure in adjusting for possible attrition bias in the sample for this study.

The comparison sample. We will compare the $6^{\text {th }}$ wave of the panel with a new sample of respondents who represent the same population as the original panel respondents. This new comparison sample is different from the new cross-sectional sample that will be used to assess changes in marital quality between 1980 and 2000 (the first aim), although it will overlap with it. The comparison sample will be drawn from the population of persons in households with a telephone who were married and living with a spouse in 1980 and were under 55 years of age in 1980. In 2000, these persons will be age 38 through 75 , and they may not be currently living with a spouse or the same spouse they had in 1980. We plan to interview approximately 1,500 persons meeting these characteristics. We will compare this sample with the $6^{\text {th }}$ wave panel respondents. The only differences between these two samples should be due to random and nonrandom sampling error and attrition bias. It is possible that the response rate in the 2000 comparison sample will be different than the response rate we obtained in 1980 because of the
observed decrease in response rates to telephone surveys over the last two decades. We are planning to use monetary incentives to increase the response rate in 2000 (among those who initially decline to be interviewed), but differences in the kinds of persons who choose not to participate may still exist. A comparison of the demographic make-up of the sample with census data will be made to evaluate any such bias due to differential response rates. Assuming the sampling errors are random, any significant differences in characteristics and relationships between the two samples should reflect attrition effects. Overall comparisons of the means and distributions of a number of demographic and social psychological measures will be generated, but the focus will be on comparing some of the findings that relied on later waves of the panel data to examine marital and individual outcomes.

Specific cross-sectional and panel comparisons. The substantive problems we plan to examine will depend on the differences we observe in the means and distributions of the variables, but one likely research problem that would benefit from a comparison of the results in the two samples is the effects of marital dissolution/divorce and remarriage on psychological distress (Booth and Amato, 1991; Johnson and Wu, 1997). Using later waves of the panel data, these studies found that psychological distress decreased with time following a divorce, although this decline occurred primarily among individuals forming new relationships and remarrying. Since divorced persons were only present in later waves (all initial respondents in the panel were married) and the possibility exists that the persons going through the most stressful disruptions may have been disproportionately selected out of the later waves, this would be a critical comparison to evaluate this type of attrition bias. Of course, only those components of the analysis of the panel data that do not involve measures of psychological distress before the disruption occurred could be compared, since that data would not be available in the crosssectional group. Two other research studies that could be partially replicated with the new crosssection are the effects of retirement on marital quality (Myers and Booth, 1996) and the relationship between perceived health of the respondent and spouse on marital quality (Booth and Johnson, 1994). Both make primary use of later waves of the panel and may be affected by attrition of less stable married persons from the panel.

Comparison of marital disruption rates. Multiple decrement life table methods will be used to develop duration-specific disruption rates from the panel and the cross-sectional comparison group. Since we have information on whether and when disruptions occurred in the panel and will have a marital history on individuals in the cross-sectional comparison, these rates can be computed from both samples. This comparison will provide valuable information on the extent to which the degree of marital disruption may be underestimated in the panel data. If differences are found, then hazard models can be used to evaluate whether the determinants of divorce in both samples are similar or different and identify where the largest differences occur.

Development of case weights to adjust for bias. It is quite common in survey samples for researchers to develop a series of post-stratification case weights to bring a sample back to proportionality relative to population characteristics (Winship and Grabill, 1994). While it is currently possible to do this for some characteristics in the panel by developing weights that are the inverse of the attrition rate of selected background characteristics (e.g., gender, age, race) it is not possible with many of the characteristics that are likely to vary considerably over time and may not be closely related to their level in 1980, such as the various measures of marital quality, social psychological measures such as psychological distress, and measures of household composition, division of household labor, etc. It may be possible, for example, to find higher levels of marital happiness in the panel than in the comparison cross-sectional sample, even though we know from previous analysis that 1980 levels of marital happiness do not predict
attrition. This could occur if panel participants were a more stable group and a long period of stability was associated with increased marital happiness. Developing case weights from comparisons with the new cross-sectional sample would allow us to identify such effects and provide weights to adjust for them. These case weights would correct for bias in measures of central tendency (such as means and percentage distributions), but their value in estimating effects, such as in regression models, depends on whether the weights are related to the independent or dependent variables. Generally, use of weights that are related only to the independent variables are not necessary in regression type models, as the regression coefficients are not biased (Winship and Grabill, 1994). The use of weights will reduce bias when they are related to characteristics typically endogenous in analysis models, such as marital and personal outcome measures and indicators of family and marital processes. Regression type models can use these weights related to the dependent variables to reduce bias, but as in any analysis of weighted data, care must be exercised in using the appropriate statistical procedures to estimate the standard errors (Winship and Grabill, 1994). We plan to do comparisons of weighted and unweighted data for several substantive problems to evaluate the efficacy of these weighting methods. Our initial focus will be on the studies discussed above, involving (a) the effects of divorce and remarriage on mental health, (b) retirement and marital quality, and (c) health and marital quality.

Analysis of the components of the Heckman correction in the Marital Instability panel data. The final strategy for assessing and correcting selection bias is to explore more completely the use of the Heckman correction. This technique typically involves two steps. In the first step a probit analysis is run in which the dependent variable is whether people in the sample responded to a survey item. In the case of correction for panel attrition, it is whether or not the person participated in the panel wave. The independent variable(s) in the probit equation are selected characteristics of all respondents (usually measured in the first wave when all persons responded) that are expected to predict attrition. The results of the probit analysis are used to generate for each person who responded to the panel a probability called the Mills Ratio. The inverse of the Mills Ratio is then included as a predictor in an OLS regression equation estimated for the panel respondents. Stolzenberg and Relles (1997) present an analytic technique to partition the bias due to selection into six components which, when multiplied together, equal the selection bias effect. These components include a measure of the adequacy with which the variables in the selection equation account for selection, the explained variance in the regression model, the relation of the inverse Mills Ratio to the regression dependent variable and independent variables, and estimates of correlations among error terms in both equations. These components provide information about the conditions under which selection bias is likely to result. While the components are designed to apply to a specific regression model with a designated set of selection variables and independent variables in the regression equation, some of the quantities, such as a coefficient from the probit analysis which indicates how well the predictors in the probit model account for selection, can be generalized to a wide variety of regression models. In making use of these analytic techniques, we will evaluate whether Heckman's procedure would be appropriate to adjust for selection bias in this data set and to specify those situations where it is found to be appropriate.

Products of the study. The consequences of panel attrition from long-term panel studies of marriage and family variables are generally unknown. While our previous analyses with limited information and analytic tools suggest that the degree of bias is minimal, the additional studies and data planned here will allow us to assess the bias in a more rigorous manner. Our results will provide comparisons, weights, and guidelines for future researchers making use of
the data to evaluate and adjust for attrition bias. We plan to include this information not only in research papers submitted for publication but also in a set of materials that will be provided with the public domain release of the data. The procedures developed here also can be generalized to other long-term panel studies.

## Aim Four: Building a National Family Research Asset

In addition to meeting the three aims noted previously, adding a new cross-section and a 6th wave of data will greatly enhance the scientific value of this public use data set for other researchers. The Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study has many valuable features. Indeed, it is one of the longest-running, longitudinal, national studies of marriage and family life in existence. While some other studies have a longer history (such as the Panel Study of Income Dynamics and the National Longitudinal Survey of Youth), they do not have the same breadth and depth of questions on marriage and family life. Similarly, although the General Social Survey encompasses a wider period of cross-sectional studies, it does not contain the detailed information on marriage and family covered by our study. Furthermore, in 1992 and 1997, we interviewed nearly 700 young adult offspring from these marriages. These data allow us to match the circumstances of parents' lives (as early as 1980) with outcomes for their children in early adulthood. The combination of longitudinal data from two generations creates many possibilities for answering important questions about intergenerational relations and influence.

Funding a 6th wave of data collection, along with a new cross-section, will give the Marital Instability panel substantial new strengths. Specifically, we would have enough data points to (1) separate age, period, and selection effects; (2) better separate long-term trends in marriage from temporary variations; (3) better differentiate linear from nonlinear trends; (4) directly cover a 20 -year period of the life course (as much as 75 years when retrospective data is included); (5) study people who move from early adulthood into middle age, as well as study people who move from middle age into the older years; and (6) make better use of powerful analytic procedures that have been developed to study repeated measures, such as pooled time series analysis and latent growth curve analysis.

The Marital Instability panel study also includes a substantial amount of data on employment, income, assets, positive and negative life events, psychological well-being, health, social support, and gender roles. Consequently, researchers can use this data set to answer a variety of questions that do not specifically deal with family. Indeed, researchers in 89 institutions now use our data, which is available from the American Family Data Archive and the University of Michigan ICPSR. What has become a national research asset will become even more valuable with the proposed additional cross-sectional and longitudinal components.

## C. PRELIMINARY STUDIES

The proposed study has the advantage of building on a longitudinal study that began in 1980. Extensive efforts were employed to maintain the integrity of the panel. Respondents who had relocated outside the U.S. were called. Respondents who had obtained an unlisted phone were sent a letter requesting continued participation. Reluctant respondents were given the option of completing the interview schedule by mail. Between waves we regularly contacted respondents twice by mail and telephone to avoid losing track of them.The tracking procedures used are reported elsewhere (Booth and Johnson, 1985). Spanish-speaking interviewers were used as needed. In 1997, a special letter was sent to minorities, indicating that their voice is especially important to the study.

The cross-sectional survey data from 1980 and longitudinal data up through 1997 serve
as a basis for carrying out the aims of the proposed study. In fact, there is no other data set upon which we could build in order to meet the demands of the proposed study. The preliminary studies have resulted in a team of researchers with excellent working relationships. The project has led to more than 50 publications (mostly in refereed journals) and a book published by Harvard University Press. The list of publications may be seen in Appendix B. The published studies have contributed much to the development of the proposed projects, and this contribution is reflected in the frequent citation of these studies in the proposal.

## D. RESEARCH DESIGN AND METHODS

## Data Collection Needs

To achieve the aims of the study we will build on the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study which began in 1980. We propose to (1) exactly replicate the 1980 national survey of married persons under the age of 55 who have telephones, (2) interview a supplementary random sample of people between the ages of 38 and 75 who were married in 1980, and (3) reinterview persons who were part of a sample of married persons first interviewed in 1980 who were subsequently re-interviewed in 1983, 1988, 1992, and 1997. The replication of the 1980 survey is necessary to assess changes in marital quality that have occurred since 1980 . Not only will the new cross-section include the measures of marital quality that may have changed, but also will include a wide range of variables that may explain observed changes.

We plan to interview a total of 2,900 people in the cross-sectional survey. From these, 2,000 will meet the requirements necessary for the replicate sample, 1,500 will fit the definition for inclusion in the comparison sample, and approximately 600 will be included in both groups (the overlap group). We estimated these proportions using the most recent Census age and marital status data, as well as data from the NSFH cross-sectional survey, which has more detail on marital history.

The interview supplement of people under 75 years of age who were married in 1980 is essential to carry out the third aim of the study. The original survey of people under 55 will have aged 20 years by 2000. In order to assess the effect of selection due to attrition we need to interview a sample of people who are under 75 but over the age of 38 (to reflect the current age of people who are representative of those in the original survey) who were married in 1980. The supplementary sample would represent the contemporary marital status of people who were married in 1980 but are no longer married due to divorce, permanent separation, or the death of a spouse. Some of those interviewed for the supplemental sample (those between 38 and 55 who are married) will also serve as respondents in the replication survey. We estimate that 909 additional interviews will be needed for the supplemental sample.

To carry out the second and third aims of the study, the original sample needs to be interviewed for a sixth time. In relation to the second aim, the 6th wave will capture a considerable number of respondents moving into older age categories. Between 1997 and 2000, we estimate that 54 people will shift into the over 40 category, 121 people will shift into the over 60 category, and 85 people will shift into the over 70 category. New questions on health will be added to the sixth interview, as will items needed to measure key explanatory mechanisms. Finally, the 6th wave of data will increase the number of marital changes (such as divorce and remarriage) which have the potential for affecting health. We expect to interview about 952 people in this wave.

## Sampling Procedures

The sampling for the 2000 cross-section will replicate as much as possible the sampling
procedures used in the 1980 survey with changes reflecting improvements since 1980 in telephone interviewing technology and sampling methods that should yield a more efficient sample. Both cross-sectional components of the survey will be generated from a single sample of households that will be interviewed with a short screening instrument. The population administered the screener will consist of all persons living in households with a telephone in the continental United States (excluding Alaska and Hawaii-these were excluded in 1980). The screener interview will ascertain whether the person in the household falls into the categories of the characteristics necessary for the two samples. For the cross-sectional replication, the screener will determine if anyone in the household is currently married, living with their spouse, and age 55 or under. If there is more than one person in this category in the household, a random number on the screener will determine which one will be selected to be interviewed. For the comparison sample, the screener will determine if any adults in the household are between the ages of 38 and 75 and were married and living with a spouse in 1980. If more than one person meets these criteria a random number will be used to select one of them.

A random-digit-dialing sampling frame will be used to generate the numbers called. The sample will be purchased from either Survey Sampling, Inc. or Genesys. While we generated our own sample in 1980, purchase of a sample provides a more efficient and accurate sampling frame, given the increased complexity of the phone system with changes in area codes, cellular numbers, etc. Several alternative RDD designs are available to increase the call hit rate, yet insure a representative sample of all households with telephones. We plan to use a design that screens out random numbers selected in 100's blocks that have no listed numbers. (All numbers with the same first 8 digits make up a 100's block.) This procedure increases the percentage of numbers called that are good while only eliminating a very small fraction of potential respondents with telephone numbers recently added to previously unused 100's blocks. To insure that persons in these zero-listing blocks are not completely excluded from the sample, numbers will also be sampled from them but with a much lower sampling fraction (1/10 of the normal fraction). Our experience with this design in a number of surveys conducted by the Bureau of Sociological Research finds that the proportion of the sample that falls in the zero-listing 100's blocks is usually less than 1 percent. Compared with the clustered RDD design used in 1980, the proposed design provides more efficient samples, since any potential clustering effect on standard errors is removed. In addition, the numbers in the sample will be geographically stratified to insure proportional representation in all regions.

The interviews will be conducted by the Bureau of Sociological Research, which has more than 30 years experience in fielding local, statewide, and national interview surveys and has collected the data for the first five waves of the Marital Instability Over the Life Course Study. The telephone interviews are conducted with state-of-the-art computer-assisted telephone interviewing software (CASES). For the new cross-sections, unresolved numbers will be called a minimum of 15 times, and conversion of soft first-time refusals is routinely attempted three or more weeks after the first call. For the panel, continued attempts will be made to contact unresolved numbers until the end of the study period. Many of the interviewers employed by the Bureau have worked on multiple projects over a number of years, and all interviewers go through an extensive training process. Spanish-speaking interviewers are on staff to cover situations in which the selected respondent mainly speaks Spanish, or is most comfortable with a Spanish interview. Other languages also can be accommodated when needed.

The re-interview of the panel respondents will follow a set of procedures we have used in the previous waves. We have maintained a database of panel respondents in which address and telephone number information is recorded and maintained. A number of panel respondents have
graciously informed us on their own of changes in address or telephone number and these have been added to the database. Approximately six months before the re-interview is to begin, we will begin the tracking process. Respondents will be sent a first-class letter with a forwarding address request so the post office will inform us of the address to which the letters may be forwarded. The respondents will be asked to call our toll-free 800 number to let us know of any changes in telephone number or address. Undeliverable letters and forwarding information will be sent through the tracking process, in which a number of procedures will be used to locate the respondents. These procedures have been successful in the past, and since the 1983 wave, we have been able to locate all but 83 of the respondents. (The attrition rate was considerably lower among respondents who gave their names and addresses in any of the previous waves.) About one month before the interviewing will begin, we will send another letter informing respondents that we will be contacting them soon to interview them.

## Interview Schedules

The cross-section interview. The interview schedules for the cross-sectional replication sample and supplement sample will be very similar to the 1980 interview schedule. About 10\% of the questions will be dropped. We will exclude these questions either because they had little utility in prior analyses, or because they would contribute little to the current aims of the proposed study. The Langner (1962) depression scale was not included until 1983, but we will add it to the year 2000 interview schedule because of its value in understanding change and attrition. A draft of the interview schedule can be found in Appendix C. The format of the interview schedule will be somewhat different because the Bureau of Social Research has since adopted computer-aided interviewing.

The 6th wave interview. The 6th wave interview will include the core questions found in the previous five waves, including items dealing with marriage, family life, employment, income, social support, gender roles, psychological well-being, and health. The measures of health included in prior waves refer to (1) five common diseases (diabetes, arthritis, heart trouble, cancer, high blood pressure), (2) health or physical conditions that restrict everyday activity, (3) a self-rating of health as excellent, good, fair, or poor, and (4) awareness of aging as indicated by recent declines in eyesight, hearing, teeth, energy, hair, skin, and body shape. In relation to psychological well-being, previous waves included a measure of distress symptoms, a self-esteem scale, a single item measure of overall happiness, a life satisfaction scale, and a "life regrets" scale.

The 6th wave interview will strengthen the health measures. First we will add questions dealing with respiratory diseases (chronic bronchitis or emphysema) and a measure of injuries that required a physician's care. In addition, we will add an extensively-used scale of 54 disease symptoms (Wickrama et al., 1997; Wyler et al., 1968;). These symptoms appear to serve as valid indicators of the seriousness of an individual's health from the standpoint of prognosis, duration, threat to life, degree of disability, and degree of discomfort. Information on height and weight will be collected to construct the Quetelet index, which is a measure of obesity. We also will add an item that asks individuals to compare their current health with their health one year ago; this will serve as an indicator of perceived change. Finally, we will include items on parent's health to control for health conditions that respondents might have inherited from their parents.

Few measures are available of the causal mechanisms that are proposed to link marital and family history to health--in particular, having an orderly lifestyle and mattering. Consequently, we will construct an orderly lifestyle scale with items that tap getting enough sleep, eating balanced meals, getting regular exercise, wearing a seat belt, and engaging in fewer risky behaviors, such as drinking, drug use, and smoking. In addition, the scale will assess the
extent to which individuals engage in behaviors such as driving fast, having accidents, and getting into fights outside the household. We also will construct an instrument to measure mattering, which will consist of two components: the extent to which the individual believes (1) her/his spouse cares for and values her/him, and (2) her/his spouse is dependent upon her/him. A preliminary set of items has been developed for each scale. A draft of the items (not yet complete) that will make up these scales appears at the end of the 1997 interview schedule (see Appendix D). The items will be pretested and checked for dimensionality and reliability. The items on mattering will be factor analyzed with the existing marital quality scales to ensure that they are measuring independent constructs.
Plan of Analysis
Aims one, two, and three (as outlined earlier) each subsume several related projects. The complexity of the methods needed to conduct each of these projects precludes describing all of the relevant analyses. Therefore, we present one detailed example of an analysis for each of the three aims.

Changes in marital quality between 1980-2000. This analysis will utilize the 1980 and 2000 cross-sections to focus on changes in the level of marital quality between these periods. Five scales of marital quality were included in the 1980 interview schedule: happiness, interaction, disagreements, problems, and divorce proneness. We will administer these scales again in 2000. Confirmatory factor analysis with the 1980 data indicated that the scales reflect two latent variables: positive marital quality (happiness and interaction) and negative marital quality (disagreements, problems, and divorce proneness) (Johnson, White, Edwards, and Booth, 1986). Our first step will be to use structural equation methods to create similar latent variables for the 2000 data. Loadings of each observed indicator (the marital quality scales) on the latent variables will be fixed across the two cross-sections (1980 and 2000) to ensure that the latent variables are measured on the same scale in both groups.

The next step will be to use a multigroup model to see if there are significant differences in latent means across the two periods. Assuming that differences in marital quality means are significant, the next step will be to explain these differences. We will begin by adding age, age at marriage, number of children, education, race, and marriage order to the model as predictors of marital quality. It may be that marriages in 1980 and 2000 differ in quality, but only because the two groups are differently constituted. With these demographic variables in the model, we will see the extent to which differences in latent means are attenuated (or strengthened).

Assuming that significant differences in marital quality persist, the next step will be to assess the role of several explanatory factors, including economic stress (men's and women's earnings, periods of unemployment, use of public assistance, perceptions of economic hardship), work-family conflict among dual-earner couples with preschool children, husband's and wife's gender role attitudes, the proportion of housework and child care performed by husbands, prior cohabitation, premarital births, and attitudes toward the acceptability of divorce. These predictors will be introduced into a series of models (one for each explanatory variable or set of explanatory variables) to determine the extent to which they account for marital quality, not only within each period, but also across the two periods. For example, if the gap in marital quality between 1980 and 2000 decreases when we enter the block of variables measuring economic stress, then this would suggest that changes in economic factors account for some of the change in marital quality. As a final step, we will enter all the explanatory variables into a single model to see if we can account completely for any changes in marital quality between the two periods.

Family and marital history, and the health and well-being of the middle-aged and elderly. To assess the impact of family and marital history on health and well-being, we will
draw on the proposed 6th wave of interviews, as well as the preceding five waves of data. The sixth interview will yield approximately 952 people between the ages of 38 and 75 . Of these, $85 \%$ will be married, $10 \%$ will be divorced or separated, and the remaining $5 \%$ will be widowed. We also estimate that $32 \%$ will be age 60 or older. There appears to be sufficient variability in people's family and marital history to meet the needs of the proposed investigation. For example, we estimate that 98 of the currently married individuals will have experienced a parental divorce prior to reaching age 19. (Of these, 65 will have mothers who remarried.) Among respondents whose parents remained married, 372 will report some unhappiness in their parents' marriage and 80 will report severe unhappiness. With respect to parent-child relations, 186 will report not being close to their mothers, 259 will report not being close to their fathers, and 97 will report not being close to either parent. Eighty-nine will have had a premarital birth, and 113 will have experienced premarital cohabitation. A number (137) will report marrying before the age of 19. Another substantial portion (161) will report being a stepparent. Over their life times, 218 respondents will report a divorce followed by a second marriage, and 40 will report multiple marital dissolutions and remarriages. There also is sufficient variability in marital quality to conduct the proposed investigation. As indicated in an earlier section, there are large numbers of continuously married individuals who have experienced substantial fluctuations in marital quality during the study.

As example, one analysis uses a measure of the respondents' health as the dependent variable. Independent variables include family-of-origin characteristics (parents’ marital quality, divorce, and remarriage), the respondents' current marital quality, and respondents' experiences with divorce, remarriage, and stepfamilies. We will begin by regressing indicators of health on family-of-origin variables (singly and collectively) while controlling for age. The attrition analysis may identify additional variables that would need to be controlled to minimize selection bias. If weights are used to adjust for bias, then robust regression methods in STATA will be substituted for OLS to produce more accurate standard errors. The next step will add premarital and marital history variables (such as the number of marital disruptions, levels, and variability in marital quality across the previous waves) to the equation to see if family-of-origin effects are operating through subsequent marital events and marital quality. We will then check to see if family-of-origin effects are moderated by the respondent's gender or marital duration by including appropriate interaction terms in the model. Finally, we will check for a possible selection effect by including, as a control variable, a scale that taps behaviors that reflect problematic personality traits (such as being in trouble with the law, substance abuse, and violence). These analyses would be repeated for measures of both physical and mental health.

Sample attrition and the integrity of results in family research. The analysis example for this phase of the study focuses on the research procedure to be used to evaluate the effects of sample attrition on findings from the panel sample. In this example, we will focus on the relationship between length of time since a divorce and the degree of psychological distress. This task will be accomplished by comparing the results in the 2000 panel and the cross-sectional comparison sample. The panel and cross-section samples will be pooled together with a binary indicator of sample type (panel=0, cross-section=1). Only people experiencing a marital disruption will be included in the sample. Variables in the model will include the scale of psychological distress, time since disruption in decimal years, whether the person has remarried or cohabited since the disruption, and a set of control variables. We will carry out an OLS regression model with psychological distress as the dependent variable and decimal years since the disruption and type of sample as the primary independent variables. An interaction term between years since disruption and type of sample will be included to evaluate if adjustment to
divorce is similar in both samples. Models with and without remarriage and cohabitation since the divorce will be compared, and interaction effects with the type of sample will be added for these factors as well. These models will allow us to see if patterns of adjustment to marital disruption and the level of psychological distress among persons experiencing a disruption were the same in both samples. For example, if the additive term for sample type is significant and positive, then it would suggest that there is a higher rate of psychological distress in the crosssection sample, which would provide evidence for the selection out of the panel of persons experiencing more difficult divorces. Similarly, if the interaction term involving sample type is significant, then it would suggest that attrition has affected the nature of the relationship between the predictors and divorce adjustment.

## Timetable

Year 1. The interview schedules will be further developed and pretested, and the new measures will be analyzed for dimensionality and reliability. The sample of telephone numbers will be drawn, and interviews for the two cross-sectional components and the panel component will commence. It is estimated that two-thirds of the survey work will be completed. Year 2. Interviewing will be completed and the data will be transformed into SPSS system files.Variables will be defined, scales constructed, and data checked for errors and cleaned. Data analysis will commence. Year 3. Data analysis and report writing will continue.

## E. HUMAN SUBJECTS

1. The research outlined in this proposal involves interviews with 952 adults in the United States interviewed by telephone five times previously in connection with this study. In addition, we plan to interview a cross-section of 2000 married individuals under the age of 55 another 909 people between the ages of 38 and 75 who were married in 1980. Respondents in the crosssectional surveys will be selected through a random digit dialing procedure. If there is more than one eligible individual, another random procedure will be used to select the respondent.

Every effort is made to ensure that women and minorities are included in the survey in proportion to their number in the population. When we started the panel study of married persons under the age of 55 in 1980, $4.8 \%$ of the sample consisted of African-Americans which was very close to the proportion they represented in the U.S. population at that time. The proportion of the sample which consisted of other minorities (not including Hispanics) was $1.8 \%$ of the sample, a figure also very close to their representation in the population. In the 1996 wave of interviews African-Americans consisted of $2.8 \%$ of the sample and other minorities $1.2 \%$ of the sample. Further analysis shows that being an African-American male is not a predictor of attrition. Rather it is females who divorce that account for the greatest attrition among African Americans. While the decrease in minorities is of great concern, the loss is not due to a lack of effort on our part to maintain the integrity of the panel. We use state-of-the-art methods at every point in the study to keep attrition at a minimum. Respondents who relocate outside the U.S. are called. Respondents who obtain an unlisted phone number are sent a letter requesting the new number and continued participation in the study. Reluctant respondents are given the option of completing the interview by mail. Between waves we contact respondents twice a year by mail and phone to avoid losing track of them. Spanish-speaking interviewers are used as needed. In 1996 a special letter will be sent to minorities indicating that because they are a minority, their voice is especially important to the study. The letter will emphasize the responsibility they have to remain in the study so that the results accurately reflect their views and circumstances. We treat attrition among minorities very seriously and after each wave of interviews we do extensive
analysis of a wide range of factors that predict attrition and send the results of our analysis to other users of the data set.

The same procedure that were used in obtaining a reproductive cross section in 1980 will again be used in 2000. This would include having African-American interviewer call number with area code that have many minority representation. Other procedures that help to ensure minority representation are described in the sampling procedures section of the proposal.
2. The information will be obtain by telephone interviews that are carried out by staff members of the University of Nebraska Bureau of Sociological Research.
3. Informed consent will be implied if the subject answers the questions after having been informed about the goals and sponsors of the study and reminded of his/her participation in it. Therefore, formal informed consent will not be obtained. Agreeing to be interviewed is assumed to give informed consent. Their action will be recorded by the interviewer at the time of the call. Respondents will be advised that the only possible risk, lack of confidentiality, will be carefully guarded.
4. The chief risk to the respondent would be embarrassment in the situation where his or her responses became publicly known. Great care is taken that no response can be identified with a particular individual.
5. Arrangements to protect the rights of individuals who choose to take part in our study will be extensive and occur at many points throughout the course of the project. Efforts begin with the employment and training of interviewers. Each interviewer is carefully screened and trained before beginning work on the project. Any indication that they might discuss information given to them in confidence with persons other than project staff, or otherwise violate the rights of the respondent, is grounds for dismissal. Considerable training time is devoted to teaching interviewers how to protect the rights of respondents and to impressing them with the importance of confidentiality. Interviewers receive 20 hours of training before beginning the project.

People who are contacted for an interview have an opportunity to decline to participate at any time. Furthermore, no sanctions are attached to refusing to participate. Interviewers are not allowed to use coercion of any type to obtain the respondents cooperation. The respondent is advised that the information is held in strict confidence, is reported only in summary form, and is never attached to his or her name. They are also told that the fact they are a participant in the study is also held in strict confidence.

Following the interview, names and other identifying information are removed from the protocols. Only an identification number serves to link the records with individuals. The list linking numbers with names is kept under lock and key, the only access to which is by the Principal Investigator. The list is seen only by the Principal Investigator and the Bureau secretary who assists in keeping the records.

The history of the Bureau of Sociological Research in protecting the rights of respondents is excellent. They have conducted dozens of studies over the last 30 years and so far as we know, the confidence of the respondent has never once been violated.

Because the quality of marital relations is a sensitive topic, each interviewer will undergo an indepth interview by the supervisor to determine whether they are capable of maintaining a thoroughly neutral posture with respect to marital relations. Interviews will also be prepared to give the telephone number of a competent referral service should the respondent request information on social services.
6. We are aware that survey research asks much of the people who consent to be interviewed, but offers little in return of direct benefit. Respondents who ask are always given copies of reports generated by the study. Those seeking information on social services will be provided a means whereby they can get in touch with competent help. However, we believe the proposed study will provide more indirect benefits than most. The study deals with a matter of direct concern to the respondent. The study will increase understanding of the sources of change in marriages and the consequences of those changes. The results will be used to alter the character and distribution of human social services of which people with marital difficulties could avail themselves. In this way the respondent and his fellow citizens will benefit from the survey.

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## H. CONTRACTUAL ARRANGEMENTS

The University of Nebraska Bureau of Sociological Research is the logical unit to carry out the re-interviews of the panel and the interviews with adult offspring. The Bureau has done the first four waves of data collection and the staff are very familiar with the project. The key staff and many of the interviewers have worked on the project since data were first collected in 1980. The records, procedures, and equipment are in place to do the fifth wave. The letter of agreement from the Bureau Director and institutional representative, along with the budget sheet and lobbying certification, follow.

Since 1980 we have interviewed you five times. You have been very generous with your time, and we appreciate your interest in the study. From time to time we like to write and tell you about some of our findings. There are three studies we thought might be of interest to you.

Based on answers from people in the study, we have found that:

* High marital happiness serves as a buffer from unsatisfactory jobs. Although low job satisfaction generally results in depression and low morale, this is not the case when people have a good marriage.
* We know that marital happiness is good for children and leads to parents being more satisfied with parenting. What we didn't know is that satisfaction with parenting has a positive effect on marital satisfaction. Parents who are happy with their children and feel close to them tend to have happier marriages.
* Mothers’ employment does not seem to have negative long-term effect on children's lives. Offspring whose mothers were employed obtain as much education and are as well adjusted as offspring whose mothers stayed at home full time.

## OVERVIEW OF PUBLISHED FINDINGS FROM THE WORK AND FAMILY STUDY

Parents who are in constant disagreement with one another or who divorce are less able to provide the ingredients for a healthy and warm child-parent relationship. Adult offspring of such marriages report that during their teen years, parents were less apt to help them with school work or with personal problems. Parents and children had fewer talks together, and parents were less likely to show affection toward the child. Journal of Marriage and the Family, 1994.

Today's non-traditional families, with both parents juggling careers and domestic chores, are just as capable of producing well-adjusted, successful offspring as the traditional family of the 1950s. Those from non-traditional homes are just as likely to have high self-esteem, attend college, be married, and parent children as are individuals from traditional homes. Journal of Marriage and the Family, 1995.

Children of divorce suffer far more when parental conflict is low, than offspring whose parents have serious quarrels. They report less happiness, more psychological distress, fewer close friends and relatives, and lower quality in their own marital relationships than individuals whose parents quarreled bitterly before the divorce. For children from low pre-divorce conflict homes, divorce represents an unwelcome event, a loss of resources with no compensating gain. Those who escape high-conflict families through divorce do nearly as well as offspring who grow up in intact low-conflict homes. For these individuals, divorce is a relief since it rescues them from a hostile, dysfunctional and perhaps abusive environment. Social Forces, 1995.

Husband's retirement can have both negative and positive effects on marriage. When retirement leads to a reversal of bread winning roles, marital quality declines. Men who retire and fail to help still employed wives with house or yard work strain the marriage. On the other hand, if husbands have an unpleasant, low-status job that absorbs many hours a week or interferes with family life, they may be delighted to retire with the result that their marriage is happier than before. Husbands with a rewarding and prestigious job may find the loss of status upon retirement so stressful that marital quality suffers. Journal of Family Issues, 1996.

Most children benefit from mothers' participation in the labor force. Daughters and sons of mothers in the labor force enjoy greater education achievement and more challenging jobs than those whose mothers are not in the labor force. Daughters are spurred to higher educational attainment and more challenging jobs by the strong role model of self-sufficiency no matter how many hours mothers work. Working overtime ( 45 hours or more) does not carry the same benefits for sons as it does for daughters. Sons whose mothers worked overtime do not do as well as those whose mothers work part-time or full-time. Unlike daughters, sons do not benefit from identification with a strong female role model and, hence, have more to lose when mothers are away for long hours.

The increase in educational achievement among parents has strengthened the American family over the past three decades. Parents' education provides multiple benefits to adult offspring. Not only do children have greater income and higher status jobs, but they enjoy larger friendship networks and belong to more organizations. They have higher self-esteem, are happier, and are more satisfied with life. Best of all, they have happier marriages and are less likely to divorce. Generation at Risk: Growing Up in an Era of FamiliesUpheaval, Harvard University Press, 1997.

Despite the psychological trauma of a broken home, adult children of divorced parents are more likely to consider a divorce for themselves then are children from intact families. This increases the probability that they too will choose to exercise that option in their own marriages, regardless of their initial commitment to the relationship. Journal of Family Issues, Gender Roles, 1991.

Sharing many friends and organizational memberships tends to discourage divorce. Within the first seven years of marriage, socially isolated couples are three times more likely to divorce than couples sharing relationships outside the marriage. Friends and organizations buffer the immense changes that take place early in a marriage. Marriages beyond seven years are less likely to be sustained by shared relationships than by mutual investment in children, home ownership, and the accumulation of joint assets. Social Forces, 1991.

Divorced people who remarry are more likely to divorce than people married for the first time. Previously divorced marriage partners are more willing to accept divorce as an option. Having been through it once before, they feel they can weather a second divorce emotionally and financially. In addition, their tolerance for marital problems seems to be much lower than that of first married people. They tend to put up with less before considering divorce. Journal of Family Issues, 1992.

Health problems in a marriage, especially if they cramp social activities or change a spouse's behavior, can damage the relationship and even cause divorce. When the health of one marriage partner breaks down, the spouse may feel pressures and irritations that place the marriage at risk. When one of the partners becomes ill, this often means a drain on resources, financial and otherwise. Also, sick or disabled spouses can no longer carry their share of the everyday work load. These factors can generate resentment on the part of the healthy partner. Nevertheless, many marriages continue to be happy despite the fact that one of the partner is in poor health. Journal of Marriage and the Family, 1994.

## DESCRIPTION OF WORK AND FAMILY LIFE STUDY

The work and family life study originated in 1980 when a group of researchers was interested in explaining why wife's employment may affect the quality of family life. The original sample consisted of about 2,000 currently married respondents who were selected from across the nation (United States) using an RDD (Random Digit Dialing) method. Since then, we have spoken to the respondent in 1983, 1988, 1992, 1997, and we are, with this wave, talking with them for the $6^{\text {th }}$ time, as well as interviewing a new cross-section sample.

The study focuses on three issues. First, considerable debate centers on the question of whether marital quality has changed in recent decades. The present study will inform this debate by examining changes in marital quality between 1980 and 2000 and identifying factors that account for these changes.

Second, changes in marriage and family life have consequences for the health and longevity of the middle-aged and elderly. However, only a few aspects of marriage and family life have been studied in this context, and the mechanisms are not well understood. The results of this study will provide a comprehensive picture of the impact of family and marital history on health.

Third, the number of family and life course scholars employing longitudinal designs has increased in recent years. Yet, we know little about the ways in which panel attrition affects the accuracy of findings. The present study will compare cross-sectional and longitudinal data to gain a better understanding of panel attrition, as well as how biases resulting from attrition might be corrected.

This study will build on the Marital Instability Over the Life Course individuals which began in 1980 as a cross-section of 2,033 married people under the age of 55 . This study will replicate the original 1980 survey in the year 2000 by interviewing a new cross-section of 2,000 married people under the age of 55 . The survey will be supplemented by interviewing an additional sample of 909 people between the ages of 39 and 75 who had been married in 1980.

A sixth interview with the respondents originally interviewed in 1980 will also be conducted. These new data will allow us to assess how (a) marital quality has shifted between 1980 and 2000, (b) marital and family history affect health among the middle-aged and elderly, and (c) sample attrition affects the results of longitudinal family research.

In addition, the last two waves (1992 and 1997) interviewed the panel respondents' adult offspring. This allowed the researchers to examine information on the quality of the parents' marriage (from the parent's point of view) while the offspring was still in the household and under the age of 19 , as well as information from adult offspring about a variety of factors that might be affected by parental divorce and marital quality. For the current study, we will not be conducting telephone interviews with the offspring; however, we are conducting a mail survey for the offspring. All of the offspring included in either 1992 or 1997 will be mailed a short survey to be returned, which is the only data we will be collecting from the adult offspring.

## DESCRIPTION OF WORK AND FAMILY LIFE STUDY IRB\# 98-03-272-EP

The work and family life study originated in 1980 when a group of researchers was interested in explaining why wife's employment may affect the quality of family life. The original sample consisted of about 2,000 currently married respondents who were selected from across the nation (United States) using an RDD (Random Digit Dialing) method. Since then, we have spoken to the respondent in 1983, 1988, 1992, 1997, and we are, with this wave, talking with them for the $6^{\text {th }}$ time, as well as interviewing a new cross-section sample.

The study focuses on three issues. First, considerable debate centers on the question of whether marital quality has changed in recent decades. The present study will inform this debate by examining changes in marital quality between 1980 and 2000 and identifying factors that account for these changes.

Second, changes in marriage and family life have consequences for the health and longevity of the middle-aged and elderly. However, only a few aspects of marriage and family life have been studied in this context, and the mechanisms are not well understood. The results of this study will provide a comprehensive picture of the impact of family and marital history on health.

Third, the number of family and life course scholars employing longitudinal designs has increased in recent years. Yet, we know little about the ways in which panel attrition affects the accuracy of findings. The present study will compare cross-sectional and longitudinal data to gain a better understanding of panel attrition, as well as how biases resulting from attrition might be corrected.

This study will build on the Marital Instability Over the Life Course individuals which began in 1980 as a cross-section of 2,033 married people under the age of 55. This study will replicate the original 1980 survey in the year 2000 by interviewing a new cross-section of 2,000 married people under the age of 55. The survey will be supplemented by interviewing an additional sample of 909 people between the ages of 39 and 75 who had been married in 1980.

A sixth interview with the respondents originally interviewed in 1980 will also be conducted. These new data will allow us to assess how (a) marital quality has shifted between 1980 and 2000, (b) marital and family history affect health among the middle-aged and elderly, and (c) sample attrition affects the results of longitudinal family research.

In addition, the last two waves (1992 and 1997) interviewed the panel respondents' adult offspring. This allowed the researchers to examine information on the quality of the parents' marriage (from the parent's point of view) while the offspring was still in the household and under the age of 19, as well as information from adult offspring about a variety of factors that might be affected by parental divorce and marital quality. For the current study, we will not be conducting telephone interviews with the offspring; however, we are conducting a mail survey for the offspring. All of the offspring included in either 1992 or 1997 will be mailed a short survey to be returned, which is the only data we will be collecting from the adult offspring.

## A. WORK SCHEDULE

The clerical assistants (most likely Lori) will arrange your calling schedule with you. If you are assigned a time on a given day, it is extremely important that you are there. If you cannot be there for any reason, it is your responsibility to find a replacement. A list of other interviewers and their telephone numbers will be provided to you for this purpose. If it is impossible to schedule another interviewer, call your supervisor as soon as possible. Failure to follow these procedures can lead to your termination from the project.

## B. DAIL Y PROCEDURES

## 1. Checking In

The first thing you should do each time you come into the office to work is to sign yourself in (be sure to indicate the office or phone number you will be working at either on the sign in and/or the sign out sheet). Check your file folder. Memos to the entire staff as well as individual notes concerning problems will be placed in your folder. Don't forget to sign out too!

## 2. Preparing to Interview

Each time you come in to interview, be sure you have with you:

1. Your Interviewer's Manual
2. $\mathrm{Cl} \log ($ Green $1 / 2$ sheet)
3. Refusal log (Purple)
4. Reference sheet (Yellow)
5. Scheduled call-back sheet (Tan)
C. CONVINCING RESPONDENTS TO PARTICIPATE
6. The computer will determine the appropriate respondent. On the computer screen, you will be directed to ask about the number of 19- to 75 -year-olds in the household. After you have entered the number of eligible respondents, you will be prompted as to which adult to ask for (the oldest, youngest, middle, etc). You may only complete the interview with the designated respondent. If the designated respondent is not available, the next question will ask you to get the R's first name only. Then, when we make our call-backs, we will know who to ask for.
7. If you get an answer, ask to speak to the respondent. If the respondent is available, read the statement on computer screen. Make it as conversational as possible. Add additional information to reduce suspicion, if necessary. This phase of the telephone interview is most important in securing a successful interview. Be your most convincing and as persistent as possible.
8. The following are points you may want to make:
"... This is the only study of its kind. This study has been conducting interviews since 1980, so information from people in the year 2000 is very important because it allows researchers to look at changes in work and family life over a twenty year period."
"... Findings from this study have been widely used by counselors, social workers, judges, legislators, and others who work with families or who make decisions that affect families."
"... The results of our study have been published in scientific journals, newspapers, magazines, a book and have been the subject of television and radio broadcasts."
"... This study has helped to inform the national debate about family values."
"... Some findings discovered thus far from the study are that marital happiness serves as a buffer from unsatisfactory jobs, and that marital happiness is good for children and leads to parents being more satisfied with parenting, and that mothers' employment does not seem to have negative long-term effects on children's lives."
". . . It may seem like a long time to talk on the phone, but we can complete it in 2 or 3 different sessions if we need to. Let's just get started on it and you can stop me when you need to go."
". . . The study is sponsored by the NATIONAL INSTITUTE ON AGING, Penn State University, and the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. It is directed by Dr. Alan Booth, Dr. Paul Amato, Dr. David Johnson, and Dr. Stacy Rogers. You are welcome to call Dr. Johnson or the Bureau of Sociological Research at 1-800-480-4549 for more information, or you may call the Office of University Information at (402) 472-6965 to verify the validity of this study."
9. If R asks, "How did you get my telephone number?" Tell them that the telephone numbers were randomly generated by a computer, "Your number was selected from the randomly generated numbers to be a household which participates in this research."

## D. INTERVIEWING THE RESPONDENT - GUIDE TO GOOD INTERVIEWING

This interview should average around 40 minutes. It is designed so that much of the material is pre-coded; only a few questions are open-ended or require probing. Most questions should be asked verbatim unless otherwise indicated. There is a wide variety of questions and we think both you and the respondent will find it interesting. The interview schedule has been extensively pre-tested and we do not believe you should have significant difficulty with any of the items. Any problems or questions you do have, however, should be reported immediately to any of the supervisors or supervisory staff. If you are not completing the interviews correctly, we may request you to return to correct your mistakes--often at your own expense! A certain proportion of your interviews will be verified by Bureau staff. This means that your supervisor will contact the respondent again and verify that the interview was actually taken and all of the questions asked. Any evidence of fabricated respondents or responses will lead to immediate termination of employment. Accuracy and completeness are absolutely essential for a good, reliable interview. If you follow instructions carefully and are attentive in the training session, we believe you will find the interview task a rewarding and enjoyable experience.

## E. FILLING OUT THE HARD COPY LOGS AND SHEETS - All logs and sheets

 are in the Work and Family Life folder positioned by the sign-in sheet.
## 1. Daily Cl Log (Green $1 / 2$ Sheet)

After finishing a Completed Interview fill out the CI Log sheet. Include the record number, the respondent number, your interviewer ID number, the date, the day of week, the respondent's name, if it's a refusal conversion, and any other additional notes.

## 2. Daily Refusal Log (Purple Sheet)

When the respondent refuses to participate in the survey fill out the Refusal Log. Include the record number, respondent number (if available), your interviewer ID number, the date, the day of week, the respondent's name, if it's a second refusal, where you were in the survey when they refused, and any other additional notes. In addition, try to get their gender, marital status, and age group.

## 3. Scheduled Callback (Tan)

When a callback is needed, whether due to a partially completed interview or respondent not available, fill out the Scheduled Callback sheet. Include the record number, your interviewer ID number, the date, the day of the week, and the time for the callback to take place, the phone number to call, the respondent's name, and any other additional notes that might be helpful for the callback. After filling out the callback sheets, put them in the appropriate time slot in the folder by the sign-in sheet. If the callback is scheduled for Tuesday at 6:00 p.m., be sure to put it in the "After 5:00 p.m. Tuesday" folder.

## 4. Reference Sheet (Yellow)

At the end of the interview, a question will appear telling you to read to the respondent and fill out the reference sheet. The text to read is at the top of the sheet. After reading the first paragraph, fill in the name and address information, and then read the following paragraph, which asks respondents for references. Record the information as completely as possible. We ONLY need the husband's name as extra information when talking to female respondents; this is needed because many women are listed under their husband's name in telephone records (we do not need the wife's name when talking to male respondents). Don't forget to include the respondent number!

## SPECIAL POINTS TO CONSIDER:

1. This is a very interesting study to which all of us can relate. We are all members of families, and family life is largely what is being studied. However, it is VERY important that you refrain from sharing your own marriage, family, and work life experiences. Try to avoid engaging in conversations about your own upbringing, family life, marital status, etc.

Because we are calling across the U.S., you might find yourself calling a town or city in which you have friends or relatives in or near. Do not share the names of anyone you know with any of the respondents. You breach our code of ethics and promise of confidentiality when you present potential ties to yourself and the BOSR to the respondent or a respondent's offspring.

Be an active listener, but keep your own family and work life a mystery to the person you are talking to.
2. If at anytime during the survey the R asks their spouse for the answer, say, "We're really looking for YOUR opinions and answers."
3. This is a replication of the 1980 study, so many questions may seem to be worded a little awkward, but we need the survey items to be just like they were in 1980.
4. In 1980, we only interviewed married, heterosexual couples. Although today we have a much more diverse definition of couples, we need to keep the sample similar to 1980; thus, we will not be including gay or lesbian couples in the analysis (unless they were in a heterosexual married relationship in 1980). This should not be a problem because gay or lesbian couples will probably not report being married. However, if a R would report being married, the following screening question would ask them if they are living with their (opposite sex) "husband/wife." The R will most likely comment that they do not have a husband/wife. If such a situation arises, just ctrl-end and define the interview as a 4700 (no eligible respondent). The text offered for those who do not qualify may have to be slightly adjusted by the interviewer to match the situation.
5. When scheduling call-backs - set them up for a time most convenient for the R .
6. Difference between "Separated" and "Permanently Separated:" There are situations in the interview in which we ask the R if they are separated, such as the "married" question. In these cases we are referring to any type of separation - if the R considers it a separation, then record it as so. However, there are also situations in the survey when we refer to PERMANENT separation. In these cases we are referring to a permanent arrangement where the couple will not be getting back together EVER in the foreseeable future. Most often, these are cases where the relationship is over, but they have not actually filed for divorce (often due to financial reasons). Throughout the survey these two types of separation are distinguished in the wording of the questions - if it's referring to a permanent separation, the question will be worded as so.
7. If you're in the middle of an interview and your shift is over - please try to finish the interview. If it is not possible to do so, set up a call-back time with the R to finish the interview, OR tell a supervisor the situation so they can assign the interview to another interviewer so they can finish the interview immediately.
8. All questions referring to R's parents are referring to their biological parents (or adopted parents). Step-parents are not counted.
9. When setting up call backs: Try to set up a definite call back whenever possible; however, in those cases when this is not possible, set up an indefinite callback. When doing this, try to set the call back for a different day of the week and a different time of the day, preferably at least a few days after the day of your interview.
10. Be sure to review your call history! If you notice that you are making an indefinite call back, in which the previous call was made the same time of day, wait to call them for a few hours. You do not have to call all of the numbers in your queue - if you have a problem with one of the numbers in your queue, do not call it and notify a supervisor.
11. If you are making a call back and the screen tells you to ask to speak with either the contact name or R described in message section and both fields are blank - CTRL/END, assign it as "CB, R selected" and leave a note with the record number and phone number on it with a message explaining the situation with a supervisor.
12. If the respondent becomes upset or depressed, you might offer that perhaps this is not a good time, and that you might call back another time. If the respondent asks for advice, you can offer to have someone give the respondent a call back. Leave a note with a supervisor regarding the situation, and someone will address the situation.
13. If the person on the phone seems reluctant to participate, we have a few things you can offer them to establish that we are real: 1) we can send them a letter about the study if they give us their address, 2) offer them our toll free \# (800-480-4549), or 3) offer them out website address (www.unl.edu/bosr).
14. Be very careful when backing up in WAFL. Every time you back up past intro4 (where we designate the respondent) that respondent \# and data are erased! If you go back forward to where it was originally, the data are saved, but a new respondent \# is created. SO... DO NOT BACKUP
PAST INTRO4. If you accidently do, please leave a note for Mindy with the record \# and the respondent \#. And any time you backup, be sure to go forward to where the previous interview left off.
15. When you get a refusal try to get their age range and their marital status before they hang-up. I realize this may be difficult, but try your best. You can tell them that we're interested in finding out who is refusing and that all we need to know is their age range ( 20 's, 30 's, etc) and if their married or not. This serves two purposes - 1) we know how our sample is biased, and 2) we may convert a few this way because if you realize they will be screened out anyway, you can tell them that the computer will probably screen them out after a few questions, so you can persuade them to screen themselves out. If they still refuse, write down the information you got on the refusal log under demographics - we want gender, age, and marital status.
16. If you can tell that the respondent is getting tired, thank them for participating and remind them of how important their participation is. You can tell them how far along you are by referring to the blue bar at the bottom of your screen. Do your best to keep them interested in the survey. (There are a couple reminders in the survey.)
17. The respondent's name will appear from time to time on the top right corner of your screen. Please use their name occasionally to keep them involved! :)
18. Before you make each call, BE SURE to review the call history. To do this, click on "Attempts" and review all of the calls that have been made. It is important to highlight each call by clicking on it - this allows you to see any messages that have been left by previous interviewers. These messages are entered to HELP YOU prepare for calling that number by giving you information from prior calls!

This also helps us make sure that we're not calling people that shouldn't be
getting called again. Occasionally the system releases numbers that shouldn't be released, so keep your eyes open. If you come across a number that you don't think we should be calling, such as if the attempts show that there is already an 1100 (Completed Interview), then notify a supervisor before calling them!
19. The contact name should always be the Respondent's name! Do not enter any name into contact name unless it is the designated respondent's name.
20. Leaving messages - It is so important to leave messages whenever possible, but you only need to make the messages permanent if it is a description of the respondent (youngest, oldest, etc.) OR if it is really important - such as "only call on weekends."
21. If the respondent specifically asks for a mail survey: You can offer a disk survey to them, but in order to do so, you must:

Ask them if they have access to a computer?
Designate the Respondent - ask first few questions until you designate R (oldest,etc.)
Get the R's name and address - fill it out on yellow sheet and write DISK SURVEY on the top \& put in Mindy's folder (Be sure to include the record \#)
22. If the computer won't let you move to the next question - it probably means that the response you entered is invalid. If this happens to you and you think the response is correct - press F4 and enter correct response in the text box, and then enter "DK" for the response to the question. Write down the question and the correct response with the record \# and put in Mindy's folder. I'll go in and fix it!
23. Don't automatically accept Don't Know's - Probe for an answer! (Some people need to think awhile before answering questions, so give them time to think.)
24. If you get some type of recording with a message about the phone \# or any weird phone situation, assign it a disposition code of 4800 (phone problems) and leave a detailed message (it is not a disconnect unless the recording specifically says so).

## GUIDE TO SPECIFIC QUESTIONS:

The question number appears in the upper left-hand corner. Special instructions for selected questions follow.

SCREEN4A: If R married to more than one spouse in 1980, refer to the one they were married to the longest in 1980. If they were married to more than one spouse for equal amounts of time, refer to the most recent spouse in 1980.

SEXR: If you are absolutely certain you know the R's sex, you do not have to ask the question - just enter the sex. However, this is a very important variable, so if you have any doubts - please ask!

AGR: We already know their age group, but this question asks for their specific age. We don't ask this in the screen because it's a personal question, and we don't want to scare them off right away.

MARRIED: This is a key question - we are asking for the respondent's current marital status. It is important that you ask the full question, so that respondents who are separated are categorized as just that and not as currently married. While it is true they are technically still married, there are different sets of questions for each marital status, and some of the married questions are not appropriate for separated respondents. Also, if you get farther into the interview - say to the rest of the household table, and find this respondent is married but living alone (but not married, living apart), you may want to probe to find out why - and if you find out s/he is separated, you'll want to tell the respondent you are having computer problems so that you can contact a supervisor, change the marital status, and proceed with the appropriate questions on the interview. This question refers to R's perception of their marital status; however if they reply that they are common-law married, then consider that married.

NAM2 - MA10: The purpose of these items is to obtain information on every resident of the household. Information on up to ten people can be entered in the computer. If there are more than ten in the household, record information on additional people on the back of the yellow reference sheet. Babies under the age of one are recorded as 0 . In computing years of schooling completed, do not count nursery school, pre-school, or kindergarten years. Children who have yet to attend school are recorded as 0 .

RE2-RE10: (relation to respondent questions) A stepchild is a <2> "child of R/spouse," not "other relative." A question follows if you respond with <2>, asking the status of this child.

ED2 - ED10: (years of education questions) A GED is equivalent to 12 years of education.

OLDCHLD: This question is NOT asked of the R. It is answered by the interviewer. We need this answer for the child problem (cs88cp1-6) questions, so that we know which child to refer to.

CS9A1A - CS11A5D: (marital history questions) If the computer beeps and does not allow the answer you recorded, check to make sure the ages at marriage are correct. All of the R's ages must be less than or equal to the R's current age. And all of the ages recorded at the end of the marriage must be higher than the age at the beginning of that marriage.

CS9A5B, CS11A5B: "Intact marriages" are marriages where the couple is legally still married, and NOT PERMANENTLY separated, divorced, or widowed.

DAT1: If the R dated their spouse for less than one month - enter "0" for DAT1.
DAT1, DAT4, CS27: Read the question as written, but if R asks, "What do you mean by 'going with'?" then you may say dating or going out with. Remember, these terms might be a bit "dated," but the questions need to be asked the same way they were asked in 1980.

DAT3, LWK3, FWK3, FWO3: These questions are asked if you reported the response to dat1, lwk1, etc. was in years. It asks if the response also includes any number of months over the number of years. For example, if the respondent says 1 1/2 years, you would enter "1" for dat1, "years" for dat2, "6" for dat3 (representing six months in addition to the one year); thus, dat 4 will show 18 months. If the response is reported only in years, enter 0 for dat3 because there are no additional months. If DAT4 is incorrect it will take you back to DAT1.

DAT4, LWK4, FWK4, FWO4: translation of years to months - if this entails a long time - many years - this number of months might seem a little weird to offer. You might just preface it by saying, "Okay, so if I convert that amount of time to months, it comes to about \#\# months, does that sound about right?"

CS19, CS19A: counting children who live with you and children you don't, how many children have you had - this INCLUDES ONLY natural children and adopted children (and children who are deceased).

CS22, CS23A: Baptist, Congregationalist, Episcopalian, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Unitarian, and United Church of Christ are all <1> "Protestant."

CS28: A town house is a row house where each unit has access to the outdoors. A condominium could be either a town house or apartment.

CS30A: Refers to the year R made first payment on home.
CS30B: Record dollar value of house in thousands of dollars!! You can enter any value, not just from the examples listed. If the house's value is $\$ 100,000$ enter 100, if it's \$50,000 enter 50.

CS40, CS49C1: If $R$ is retired but working part-time, code the status highest in order on the list - in this case, you would code in <2> "working part-time," because it appears higher on the list than retired.

CS41, CS49C3: The kind of work must be obtained in enough detail so that the occupation can be coded for status and various census categories. We are referring only to employment for a wage or living - full-time or part-time, and this does not include volunteer work experiences. Therefore, obtain all of the information about the job that is asked for. In some cases, the title is enough such as elementary school teacher. But in others, it is not. For engineer, it is necessary to obtain type (e.g., electrical), duties (e.g., the individual may be a maintenance engineer who sweeps the floors and does minor repairs, or the person may be a full-time administrator), type of industry (whether it is a high tech firm or public utility may make a difference), and whether the individual is self-employed (person may be a marginally employed consultant or work for a stable high prestige firm). We don't need to know the name of the company; in fact, we'd rather not see the name, but rather a good description of the size and type of company it is. With regard to farming, please try to get as much information as possible (own vs. renting, number of acres, crops, etc.). If the R replies that they have more than one job, ask them to refer to the job they consider to be their PRIMARY job.

CS44B, CS51C2: Shift work is defined as working a non-standard shift (some shift other than 8/9 am to 5 pm shift).

CS47AA1, CS58B: Reduction in pay does not refer to reduction created by no increase in face of inflation, but refers to actual reduction in take-home dollars because of reduction in hours or salary or loss of a job.

CS47AA2, CS58C: Does not refer to transfers within the same company (such as transferring departments). Employer refers to who is paying the R. An example of a different employer would be in someone who worked for the state changed jobs and now works for a private firm. In this case the state is considered the first employer.

CS58: Unemployed refers to being laid off and being unable to find a job. People who take voluntary leaves to have a baby or go to school are not included.

CS58B - CS58E: These questions refer to the R's overall changes in their job situation over the past 3 years. It does not matter how many jobs they have had in this time period.

CS75A: If R mentions more than 10, say "We mean only your closest friends." If they decline to alter the number, enter the number they mentioned or 87 if it's greater than 87 , and merely proceed with the questioning.

CS80: This refers to housework ONLY done by R. If someone is employed to do the housework, then the R is NOT doing it.

CS88CP1 - CS88CP6: These questions are asked about the oldest child under 19 living in the household (you determined this child's name when selecting the oldest child in variable "oldchld"). It is possible that the oldest child may be very young, but we still need to ask these questions. Even if the child is only a toddler, the parents may still be able to report some problems; however, if the R will not answer the question record it as "REF."

CS117A: Enter the number of years (not the year 97, 98, 99!!)
CS131: If one or both parents are deceased, the question refers to when they were alive. If they were still married when one partner died, then they were never divorced or separated.

CS138G0: This may seem to be a question we already asked, but it's specifically asking about divorce or PERMANENT separation SINCE 1980. We already know if they've been divorced or separated in the past, but we don't know if it's been since 1980, and we don't know if it's PERMANENT.

CS140P, CS140S: The individual's contributions include their own earnings (salaries, wages, tips, interest income), plus any unemployment or disability that they receive in their own right. Family payments such as from welfare are not counted as part of either individual's contribution.

CS143: Retirement, unemployment compensation, disability, social security are not public assistance.

CS147A: Record dollar value of assets in thousands of dollars!!

## IF THE RESPONDENT REQUESTS RESULTS:

In the past, we have provided results to the Work and Family Life respondents in short paragraphs in contact letters sent to them by the study directors. This is not the type of study which is featured on Oprah or in Glamour magazine. Instead, most of the articles and books written about this study appear in scholarly journals and in academic and professional circles. There have been many articles published in The Journal of Marriage and the Family, The Journal of Family Issues, Family Relations, The American Sociological Review, among others. If the respondent requests (and only if they request the information; do not get into a habit of offering it unless they ask for it or seem reluctant without the offer) to see a list of the articles, note this. We will send them a 3-page list of the authors, titles, and journals from which they can either go to a library and read the articles or they may contact us and we will send them a copy of the article of interest to them. We will not send them copies of every article written based on this study; that would number just under 1,000 pages or so, making it impossible for us to mail.

We will not give or sell the respondent's or the children's names, telephone numbers, or contact information to anyone. You may assure respondents they will not receive marketing or sales information as a result of participating in this study. The names and contact information is removed from the data before it is analyzed so confidentiality is protected.

We also will not give the respondent's individual responses to anyone they know now or after they die. Results will only be released in summary form.

## Here's a few examples of situations you might run into and which disposition code is most appropriate:

My respondent answers several of the questions, but then hangs up on me.
$\rightarrow$ This is a "Refusal" (2110). When the person hangs up, the interviewer should press CTRL/END, then assign the refusal disposition code, and be sure to leave a detailed note describing the refusal in the message section. The message should include who refused (was it the designated respondent or the person who answered the phone), why they refused (did they give a reason), and when in the interview they refused (what was the last question they answered).

I have the designated respondent on the phone and he/she answers some of the questions, but then asks me to call back some other time because he/she has to leave for work.
$\rightarrow$ If this occurs BEFORE you have read the respondent "SCREEN1," which explains the survey, then you would code this as a "Callback, Respondent Selected" (5200). However, if this happens AFTER "SCREEN1," then you would code this as a "Partial" (1200) because it is a partially completed interview (PCI). The respondent was willing to answer the questions but for some reason was not available to continue. He/she will be called back at a later time to finish the interview according to the call back information collected by the interviewer.

## A little kid answers the phone and hangs up on me or says that there isn't an adult at home. How do I code this?

$\Rightarrow$ In such a situation, you would of course want to ask when might be a good time to try and call again and reach an adult. This would not be a refusal, but would be coded as a "Callback," either as "Respondent selected" if the respondent has already been selected (either Contact Name has a name or Message describes respondent as oldest, youngest, middle, etc.) OR as "Respondent NOT selected" if the respondent has not yet been selected.

How do I know when to code something as "Disconnected/Non-working" versus "Phone Problem?"
$\Rightarrow$ This one's simple. First of all, you need to make sure you listen to the entire computer voice message. The operator will tell you specifically if the number is disconnected/non-working or something else - if it's something else, code it as a phone problem.

## An answering machine picks up, but l'm not sure if it's a household or a business?

$\rightarrow$ If you are not CERTAIN that it is a business, then you need to code as "Business" (4510). Otherwise, code it as "Answering Machine"(2221). DO NOT LEAVE A MESSAGE ON THE ANSWERING MACHINE.

## What if the designated respondent is EXTREMELY hard of hearing?

$\rightarrow$ If the respondent is so hard of hearing that you cannot possibly finish the interview, then CTRL/END and assign the disposition code "OTHER" (4310) and be sure to leave a detailed message explaining why the respondent was unable to finish the interview.

## What if the designated respondent is in the hospital?

$\rightarrow$ In this case, you should ask the person on the phone when they expect the respondent to be back home. This should be assigned a disposition code of "Callback, Resp Selected" (5200). Just because the respondent is currently in the hospital does NOT mean that they are physically unable - we can interview them after they have recovered from their hospital stay.

## What if the person answers the phone in a language I don't understand?

$\rightarrow$ Try to determine if the person also speaks English, and if they do not speak any English, then try to determine what language they are speaking. If the person does not speak English, code the call as "OTHER" (4310) and leave a detailed message - defining what language you believe they speak. We are especially interested if they speak Spanish because we have a Spanish speaking interviewer to call those number.
is It is VERY IMPORTANT that you leave a detailed message for as many calls as possible, especially for Refusals, Phone Problems, and OTHER. The supervisors will later re-assign many of those dispositions into their appropriate place, so if the message you leave is not clear enough, you will be asked to add additional information - and this may be difficult to do from memory!!! If you do not have enough room in the message section to write your message, write the additional information on a paper with the record \# on it, give the message to a supervisor, and leave a note in the message section that there is additional information on paper.

This interview is part of a long-range study of the relationships between people's work and their marriages. I want to emphasize that your answers are completely confidential and your name will not be used, nor will any information be released that will permit people to identify you. We would like to interview you again in the future to see what kinds of changes have been taking place. In order to be able to locate you again, we would like to update our information on you.

## B. Daily Procedures

## 1. Checking In

The first thing you should do each time you come into the office to work is to sign yourself in (be sure to indicate the office or phone number you will be working at either on the sign in and/or the sign out sheet). Check your file folder. Take a look at the message boards for special day and study instructions. Memos to the entire staff as well as individual notes concerning problems will be placed in your folder. Don't forget to sign out too!

## 2. Preparing to Interview

Arm yourself with a copy of the Interviewer's Guide for this study. You should select a set of cover sheets for each shift. In selecting cover sheets, you should:

1) look in the appointments folder for call-backs to be made on a specific day,
2) then look through the call-back stack and find those that have been called previously at other times, or those indicating that the respondent will be at home during your shift. After you have selected these,
3) now you may select new cover sheets. Be very careful not to mix up the stacks of cover sheets; they are very carefully labeled on the shelves.

## 3. Cover sheets:

This is a national study. We are interviewing respondents in four different time zones ranging from 1 hour ahead of us (9:00 when we are at 8:00) to 2 hours behind us (7:00 and 6:00 when we are 8:00). PLEASE BE VERY CAREFUL TO CALL THESE DIFFERENT TIME ZONES AT APPROPRIATE HOURS:

Only take Cover sheets from one time zone at a time. COVER SHEETS ARE MARKED WITH "E," "С," "M," OR "P" UNDER THE RESPONDENT'S NAME AND ADDRESS. If you come in before 5 PM, call Eastern, at least for the first couple of hours. If you are in the office around 8 PM, try calling some of the Mountain and Pacific time zones.

## How to use cover sheets with the WinCati computer system:

1. Log in as normal onto PANEL
2. Click on the Retrieve button
3. Click on "User Defined Field"
4. Select ID and then click OK (The ID \# is the 6 digit \# that starts with an 8 and is listed above the phone \# on the cover sheet, for example, \#801488)
5. Enter the ID \# in the "To Find" Box
6. Click OK
7. The name that appears on the record should match your cover sheet - if it does not match, notify a supervisor
8. Now, follow the same process you did for the WAFL cross-section using similar disposition codes. Instead of setting up call backs in the computer, set them up using the old "cover sheet" method and stack the cover sheets in the appropriate place.

## C. PANEL RESPONDENTS -

1. The respondents you are interviewing have all been interviewed before in 1980, 1983, 1988, 1992, and in 1997. We are attempting to re-interview each respondent from the earlier surveys. This will have some good points as well as drawbacks. In the first place, it means that you should get few refusals, since all of these people have agreed to help us five times in the past. It does, however, mean that we have to find a particular person rather than selecting households at random. Some respondents will still be living in the same place as they were when we last interviewed them and it will be a relatively simple matter to find them at home and get their interview. Other respondents will have moved, will have changed their phone number, may have changed last names, etc. These people will have to be traced, a process we call "tracking."
2. Tracking - To the extent possible we have identified all of the people needing to be tracked before interviewing started. We sent letters in November and have done our best to track those who had changed their addresses. Thus, when you get a cover sheet, we have already done some work on this respondent and have every reason to believe he/she is still at that telephone number. It is still possible, however, that you will find that the respondent you are seeking is no longer at the number you call. In this instance, we are asking the interviewer to get as much information as possible, and, if unable to immediately locate the respondent, to turn the cover sheet back to the Tracking stack. It is very important in this study that we make every attempt to locate all the original respondents in the study. Most of the job of tracking respondents will be done separately from the interviewing by specially trained trackers. However, interviewers play an important part in the tracking process as it is in this step that the need for tracking a given respondent is first identified. Interviewers attach the tracking forms and it is important that the reason the respondent needs to be tracked is clearly indicated on these forms.
3. The Cover Sheet - Each cover sheet specifies a particular telephone number and a particular respondent. If the respondent is known to have moved since the last interview, the appropriate telephone number and address will be handwritten toward the right-hand side of the cover sheet under the heading, "new address and new telephone number." In addition, tracking forms will be stapled to the back of the cover sheet to show the progression of finding the respondent. The information on this tracking sheet provides the trackers with reference numbers of relatives who knew where the respondent was.
4. Each call you make must be recorded in the call-back record on the face of the cover sheet. For each call, record your interviewer number, the hour of day, date, day of week, and the result of the call.
5. It is possible that the number you dial will be unassigned. If this happens, make one call-back IMMEDIATELY to make sure you dialed correctly. If it is still unassigned, put this under "Non-interview Information" on the back of the cover sheet and return the cover sheet to the Tracking stack.
6. If you get an answer, ask to speak to the respondent. If the respondent is available, read the statement on computer screen. Make it as conversational as possible. Add additional information to reduce suspicion, if necessary. This phase of the telephone interview is most important in securing a successful interview. Be your most convincing and as resolute as possible.

## CONVINCING RELUCTANT RESPONDENTS

The following are points you may want to make:
". . . It is important that we talk with all of the people we talked to in 1997. The purpose of the study is to find out how things have changed in people's work and family life since we last interviewed you. We can only measure this change if everyone previously interviewed takes part."
". . . You are a part of a unique study. In fact, this is the only information of this kind in the world where people's work and family lives have been studied over a 20 year period."
". . . It may seem like a long time to talk on the phone, but we can complete it in 2 or 3 different sessions if we need to. Let's just get started on it and you can stop me when you need to go."
". . . The study is sponsored by the NATIONAL INSTITUTE ON AGING, Penn State University, and the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. It is directed by Dr. David Johnson, Dr. Alan Booth, and Dr. Paul Amato. You are welcome to call Dr. Johnson or the Bureau of Sociological Research at 1-800-480-4549 for more information, or you may call the Office of University Information at (402) 472-2167 to verify the validity of this study."
". . . We will be glad to send you the results of the survey if you are interested, or I can read a copy of the letter ${ }^{1}$ we sent to you last Fall. We have already sent a selection of results of previous surveys in letters addressed to you."
7. If the respondent is not there when you reach your number, find out whether the respondent lives there and, if so, when it is likely that you can catch him or her.

[^3]8. If the respondent does not live at this number try to find out as much information as possible. Try to find out whether the respondent has ever lived there, when and where they might have moved, and if the present residents have ever heard of the respondent, how long they, themselves, have lived at this number. All the information should be entered onto the back of the cover sheet (or a Tracking sheet) -- even if you simply report that no one knew the respondent. Remember, you are not a trained tracker. You should, however, get as much information as possible to aid trackers while you are on the line. In the case where the person you are talking to knows exactly what the respondent's new phone number is, however, by all means go ahead and attempt to get the interview. Be sure to: (1) enter the new telephone number and address (if possible) on the face of the cover sheet; (2) check the box which indicates that the respondent has moved; (3) check on the back of the cover sheet that you have tracked the respondent; and (4) attach the Tracking Sheet. Remember, it is not intended that you serve as trackers; use this procedure only if you are given a definite number where the respondent can be reached -do not look through telephone directories or engage in any search procedures.
9. If you get no answer or a busy signal, dial back IMMEDIATELY to make sure you have the correct number. If you still don't get an answer, fill out the details on the call-back form and return the cover sheet to the call-back stack at the end of your shift.
10. We will keep calling each number until we get either a refusal or a completion. If we get no answer after ten calls (home, business, or cellular telephone), however, we will institute special procedures to make sure it is a working number. If you get the tenth NA, mark this category in the Non-interview form and return the cover sheet to the Tracking stack.
11. Sign your initials and Interviewer I.D. number to a cover sheet only in the instances where you "close out" a cover sheet: where you complete an interview, where the respondent refuses, or where you find the respondent is deceased. All other close outs will be done by trackers.
12. The Call-Back Record is our primary means of tracing the progress of an interview. It is vital that each call you make be recorded on this sheet, REGARDLESS OF THE OUTCOME. You should use the following codes to indicate the results of your calls. Other alternatives should be indicated as clearly as possible.

## Guide to Specific Questions

Before calling the respondent, familiarize yourself with essential demographics about the respondent. Specifically, sex, age, and family composition from the 1997 Summary Table, divorce, separation and widowhood and remarriage information from the cover sheet, and information on adult offspring which will be attached.

This information will help you in two ways. First, if we have incomplete or inaccurate information for locating the respondent, the data will help you be sure that you are talking to the right person. Second, the information will help you make comparisons called for in questions on household composition and questions on changes in marital status. The information on the adult offspring will be important when you obtain the phone number and addresses of offspring at the end of the interview.

Be sure to carefully examine every page of the cover sheet. Look over the 1997 household table and familiarize yourself with. Pay close attention to any handwritten notes ANYWHERE on any of the pages of the cover sheet.

Keep in mind that these folks have been helping us out for 20 years now, and they have not received any compensation for their cooperation. Be gracious and respectful, as you always should be. The youngest adult panel respondent will be 38 years of age; the rest of the sample is older.

The screen number corresponds to the question number and appears in the upper left-hand corner. Special instructions for selected questions follow.

MAR6 - This is a key question - we are asking for the respondent's current marital status. It is important that you ask the full question, so that respondents who are separated are categorized as just that and not as currently married. While it is true they are technically still married, there are different sets of questions for each marital status, and some of the married questions are not appropriate for separated respondents. Also, if you get farther into the interview - say to the rest of the household table, and find this respondent is married but living alone (but not married, living apart), you may want to probe to find out why - and if you find out s/he is separated, you'll want to tell the respondent you are having computer problems so that you can contact a supervisor, change the marital status, and proceed with the appropriate questions on the interview.

NAM6-MA06 - The purpose of these items is to obtain information on every resident of the household. Information on up to ten people can be entered in the computer. If there are more than ten in the household, record information on additional people on the back of the cover sheet. BABIES UNDER THE AGE OF ONE ARE RECORDED AS 0. In computing years of schooling completed, do not count nursery school, pre-school, or kindergarten years. Children who have yet to attend school are recorded 0 .

REL26 - REL06 - A stepchild is a <2> child of R/spouse NOT OTHER RELATIVE. A question follows if you respond with <2>, asking the status of this child.

ED26-ED06 - (years of education questions)- A GED is equivalent to 12 years of education.

S69- It is important to confirm what our records show about the person's marital status. That is the basis upon which we which we obtain information on changes which have occurred. If the differences are so great you feel that R was probably not interviewed in 1997, terminate the interview with the excuse of computer problems and turn the cover sheet into supervisor.

S71, S73, S75-When asking the question about what has happened since 1997, keep in mind their status at that time. When you ask "How many months ago did you divorce?", be sure the time does not exceed the total elapsed time between interviews (no more than 48 months). If they say they divorced 4 years ago, make sure it was not before January of 1997. If the divorce did occur prior to the last interview, you may have to make changes to the 1997 household information page (see S115).

Asking about all of these marital statuses or changes may seem redundant or out of place, but a lot of marital changes might have happened between now and 1997, so we need to ask everyone about all of the possibilities. It is possible to have been widowed and remarried, or both divorced and remarried, etc.

COMPARE1 -"It looks like there have been some changes in your household since we last interviewed you in 1997." My records tell me ...[read info from 1997 household table]..." You have the 1997 household composition table stapled to the coversheet to refer to and to compare to their current household for each respondent. It does not include names, but does include sex, relationship to R, age, marital status, and years of education for each person in R's household in 1997. You might want to go over these people for R to see if there are any changes. It is VERY important to find out if they have been divorced, widowed, or remarried since the last time we interviewed them, so probe those categories. If there are no changes, simply press any key to continue and then enter <5> No Changes from 1997-2000 for the next question - COMPARE2.

S82-S97 - Remember to enter changes in order of occurrence. When you are finished entering changes, select <77> "None/No Other" to move onto next question.

S111 -The changes in the household should be listed on the right hand side of the screen; verify that these occurred and/or specify what's incorrect.

S115-Internal interviewer question --indicate if R says 1997 household information was correct or not. If not, key in <1>, record the changes briefly on the screen, and record the correct information on the 1997 sheet in detail.

S128 - A town house is a row house where each unit has access to the outdoors. A condominium could be either a town house or apartment.

S130 - counting children who live with you and children who don't how many children have you had ---this INCLUDES ONLY natural children and adopted children. This DOES include children who are deceased if the respondent offers or questions it.

S131 - "Do you have any children not living with you?" This includes stepchildren of R who lived with the respondent and his/her spouse at some time. It DOES NOT include stepchildren who have never lived with the R and his/her spouse.

This also DOES NOT include children who have died. If the respondent offers a child who has died, simply record the information about the child's death on the cover sheet, but record <5> "No" for the answer to this question.

S135, S232, S234A, S244, S246-(Miles away from home.) If a person doesn't know how many miles away their child lives, but knows they live in Albany, NY for example, make a note of that. (Use text key -F4.) In the text - list the city/state for both the child and the respondent. For example, Lincoln, NE to Orlando, FL.

S168+, S182+, S188+, S206+, S214+, S396+, S406+, S411+, S421+, S472+
Repeat possible responses for each stem until you are sure $R$ understands. If R. indicates a "No Opinion/Neutral" response to the strongly agree-strongly disagree questions, use "Don't Know".

S178 - "The lot of the average person is getting worse, not better." - this may sound a little funny, and it probably doesn't follow 2000 jargon. REMEMBER, though, these respondents were adults in 1980, and they didn't think it sounded too weird then, and they'll be able to relate better than you think to the wording. It's the wording that has been used the other 5 times we spoke to them, so it must be read as-is.

S188 - If the respondent lives on a farm or in a rural area and seems to have trouble knowing what the "neighborhood" is, you might offer "...your neighborhood or community..."

S189-Because we don't know yet whether or not the respondent is employed, we cannot instruct the computer to skip this question for non-employed persons. However, if someone offers, "I don't have a job or career/l'm retired/l'm not working/ etc.", you have an option <7> NOT CURRENTLY EMPLOYED to enter.

S245, S247-In regard to questions about contact with one's parents or parents-in-law, we are talking specifically about the respondent, not R's spouse or other relative. For instance, if you ask the respondent how long it has been since he/she spoke with spouse's mother and he/she replies that his/her spouse speaks to her daily, you would probe with, "... how many days has it been since you spoke with...your spouse's mother?" If R says they received a letter from the spouse's mother seven days ago, then enter 7 days. You don't need to probe to find out if the letter was addressed to R directly.

S264, S270-If R mentions more than 10 say, "We mean only your closest relatives/friends." If they decline to alter the number, enter the number they mentioned or 97 if it's greater than 97, and merely proceed with the questioning.

S283, S307, S339-If R is retired but working part-time, code the status highest in order on the list - in this case, you would code in <2> "Working part-time", because it appears higher on the list than retired.

S285, S309, S341 - The kind of work must be obtained in enough detail so that the occupation can be coded for status and various census categories. We are referring only to employment for a wage or living - full-time or part-time, and this does not include volunteer work experiences. Therefore, obtain all of the information about the job that is asked for. In some cases, the title is enough such as elementary school teacher. But in others, it is not. For engineer, it is necessary to obtain type (e.g., electrical), duties (e.g., the individual may be a maintenance engineer who sweeps floors and does minor repairs, or the person may be a full time administrator), type of industry (whether it is a high tech firm or public utility may make a difference), and whether the individual is self-employed (person may be a marginally employed consultant or work for a stable high prestige firm). We don't need to know the name of the company; in fact, we'd rather not see the name, but rather a good description of the size and type of company it is. (See Appendix)

Id4, wd4, rd4, lwk4, Iwo4, fwk4, fwo4, swk4, swo4, sep4, gos4, gow4, div4, god4 translation of years to months - if this entails a long time - many years - this number of months might seem a little weird to offer. You might just preface it by saying, "Okay, so if I convert that amount of time to months, it comes to about \#\# months, does that sound about right?" If the number of months is incorrect and you answer "no", you will be taken back to the first question - enter number, next question asks years or months..."

S290, S314, S346-Unemployment refers to being laid off and being unable to find a job. People who take voluntary leaves to have a baby or go to school are not included.

S293, S317, S349-Reduction in pay does not refer to reduction created by no increase in face of inflation, but refers to actual reduction in take-home dollars because of reduction in hours or salary or loss of a job.

S294, S318, S350-Does not refer to transfers within the same company.
DIV1 - How long since you divorced - if R asks you to clarify, say, "Since the divorce was granted by the courts."

S373, S376, S383-Read these questions as written, but if R asks, "What do you mean by "going with", then you may say dating or going out with. Remember, once again, these terms might be a bit "dated", but these same respondents knew what they meant in 1980, 83,88 , and again in 92,97 , so I don't think they'll be too confused by the use of the terms. You may be more uncomfortable with it than they are. All of the adult panel respondents are age 38 or older.

HT, HTF, HTI - These questions ask for R's height. Enter \# for HT, then enter whether it was in feet or inches for HTF, and then add any additional inches for HTI.

S450A, S450B - These questions ask about a series of health conditions. It is very important that you ask about EACH condition and wait for the R to answer yes/no to each condition. If the R answers no to a condition, leave it as is, but if they answer yes to a condition, click the box next to the condition so that a checkmark appears. After reading all of the conditions, click on the box next to "Click to move on to the next question."

S503 - Enter the number of years (not the year $97,98,99!!$ )
E538 - We are asking the respondent to remember how happy the marriage s/he was involved in when interviewed in 1980 was. Even if the respondents has divorced or widowed and remarried, even numerous times, we are asking for her/his memory of the happiness of the marriage in 1980.

S593 - "Total Family Income" refers to salaries, wages, tips, interest income - all sources of income for the household during the previous year. Do not rephrase to ask what the respondent's salary or wages were - it also includes a spouse's salary and sources of income.

S596-S597 The individual's contributions include their own earnings plus any unemployment or disability that they receive in their own right. Family payments such as from welfare are not counted as part of either individual's contribution.

S598-Retirement, unemployment compensation, disability, social security are not public assistance.

S602, S604-Record dollar value of house and assets in thousands of dollars!!
S610, S611 - Indicate yes for both if the respondent says stocks and bonds are part of the IRA or retirement plan.

S630-You need to look at the front side of the 2000 cover sheet when you get to this question. First, verify the address of R. If it is correct, simply indicate SAME ADDRESS on the reference sheet. If the address has changed, write the correct address in the appropriate area.

REFER - Then proceed to get the names and addresses of three people who will know how to locate $R$ in case he/she moves or we are unable to reach him/her. Try to get blood relatives whenever possible.

Offer the website address (it has the publications list), and if respondent does not have access to a computer, note the request for a hard copy of the publications list on the cover sheet. We will not send them copies of every article written based on this study; that would number just under 1,000 pages or so, making it impossible for us to mail. Appendix L.
Created Variables for Adult Panel, Offspring, and Cross-Section/Comparison

Two separate family income variables were created for the original panel respondents interviewed in 2000. The variable FAMINC6A was created to match the variable created in previous waves. The variable FAMINC6B was created due to the addition of income categories in 1997 and 2000.

## FAMINC6A

A combination of three items was used to construct this variable for each wave of data. The few individuals who said their income was less than $\$ 20,000$ but who wouldn't specify further, were assigned the value of $\$ 12,500$; the individuals indicating incomes of $\$ 20,000$ or above who did not specify further were assigned the value of $\$ 27,500$. The midpoint of each interval listed in the questions was used to assign dollar value. For the last five intervals (10-14), $\$ 65,000$ was used. This provided the same categories that were used in previous analyses.

## FAMINC6B

The same combination used to create FAMINC6A was used to create FAMINC6B; however, the last five intervals (10-14) were not combined into one category. The midpoint of each of the 14 intervals listed in the question was used to assign dollar value. For the last interval, \$105,000 was used.

The data collected for the new cross section in 2000 and the offspring data collected in 2000 asked a slightly different income question. Rather than computing a total family income, personal earned incomes for the respondent and their spouse were calculated. Two separate income variables were created for the new cross section and COMPARISON sample. The variables RINCOME1 and SINCOME1 were created to match the categories created in previous waves. The variables RINCOME2 and SINCOME2 were created due to the addition of income categories in 1997 and 2000. The variables OFFINCOM and SPOFFINC were created for the categories offered in the 2000 offspring survey.

## RINCOME1, SINCOME1

A combination of three items was used to construct this variable for each wave of data. The few individuals who said their income was less than $\$ 20,000$ but who wouldn't specify further, were assigned the value of $\$ 12,500$; the individuals indicating incomes of $\$ 20,000$ or above who did not specify further were assigned the value of $\$ 27,500$. The midpoint of each interval listed in the questions was used to assign dollar value. For the last five intervals (10-14), $\$ 65,000$ was used.

## RINCOME2, SINCOME2

The same combination used to create RINCOME1 and SINCOME1 was used to create RINCOME2 and SINCOME2; however, the last five intervals ( $10-14$ ) were not combined into one category. The midpoint of each of the 14 intervals listed in the question was used to assign dollar value. For the last interval, $\$ 105,000$ was used.

## OFFINCOM, SPOFFINC

The midpoint of each interval listed in the questions was used to assign dollar value for both the respondent's and their spouse's incomes. For the last wave, $\$ 60,000$ was used.
