



## To load a video into the VLC player

NOTE: As far as I can tell, Stanford videos from ecorner and some other sites will not load into VLC Player. Ecorner will allow you to download, though, and you can then load the file directly from your hard drive (unfortunately some of the videos I've tried sound weird on VLC, so you may need to download the WMV version and run it using the speed control on Windows Media Player. Some other videos cannot be loaded because the URL is not available—some of these may be recordable by RealPlayer, and you can then load them from your hard drive (see 2b below)

1. If the video has an obvious URL (e.g., YouTube videos), copy the URL (e.g., <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UF8uR6Z6KLc>). Click on the “Media” menu and then “Open Network Stream.”




Paste the URL into the address line. Be sure to select the HTTP protocol. Then click on Play and wait a moment.




2. If the video does not have an obvious URL, you can try to look for it.

a) Right-click on the video screen and look for “properties”. Note that this only works sometimes.



b) If (a) doesn't work you can try to download the video to Real Player (if this is allowed). RealPlayer SP is available at [www.real.com](http://www.real.com)

Then open Real Player, go to “My Library”. Right-click on the name of the video to find where it is located on your hard drive.



Once you've found the actual video, you can right-click on it to open with VLC
